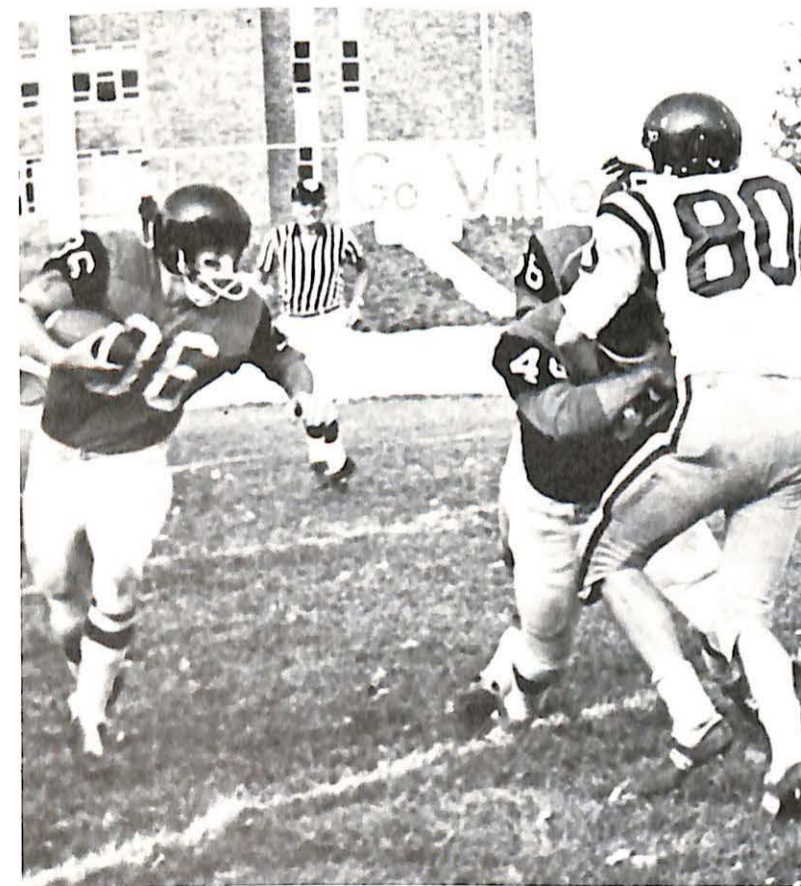

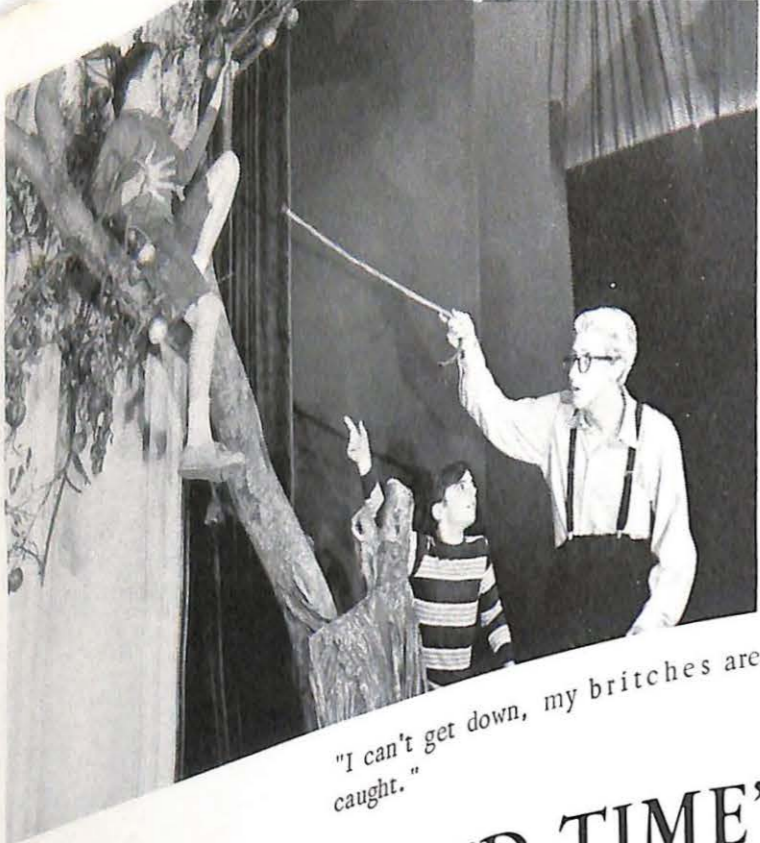

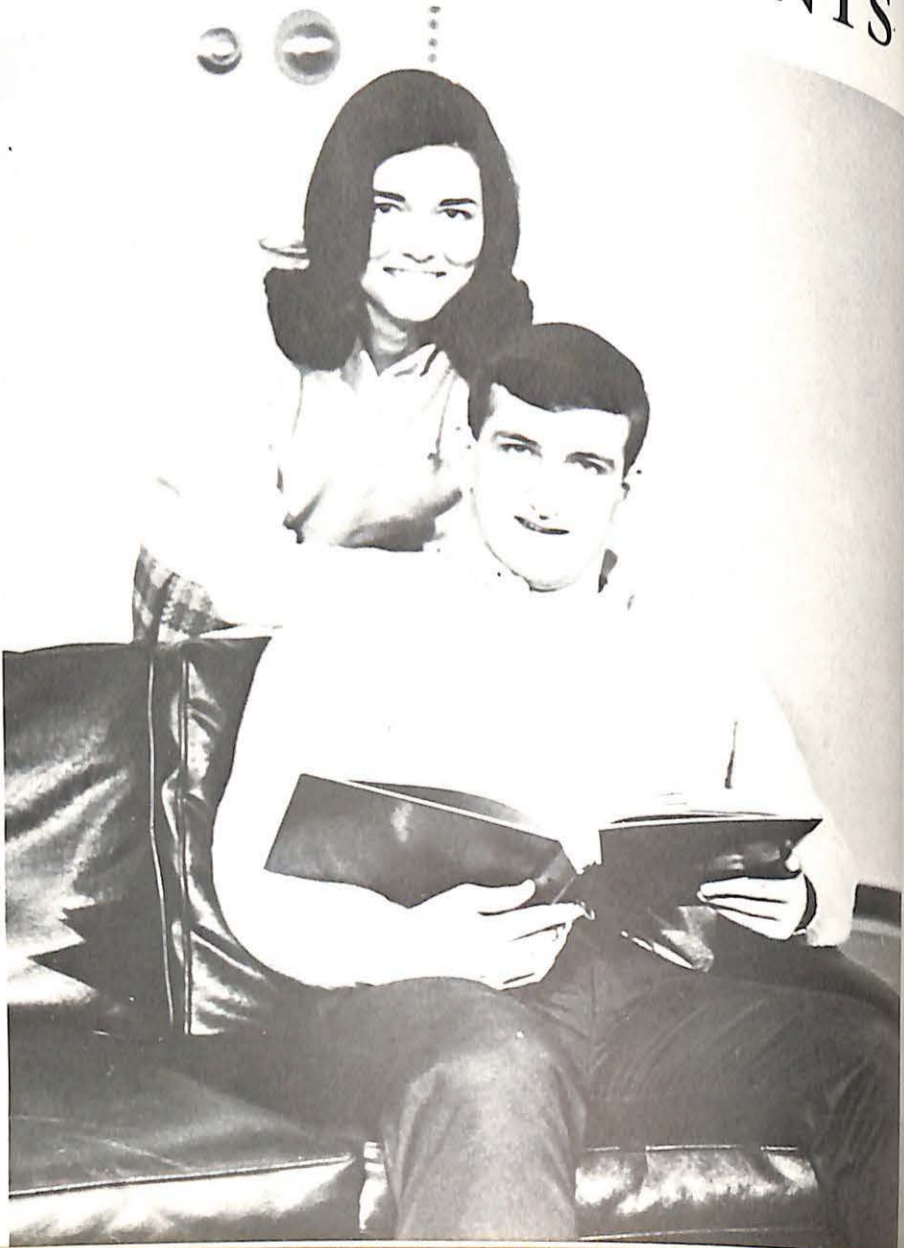

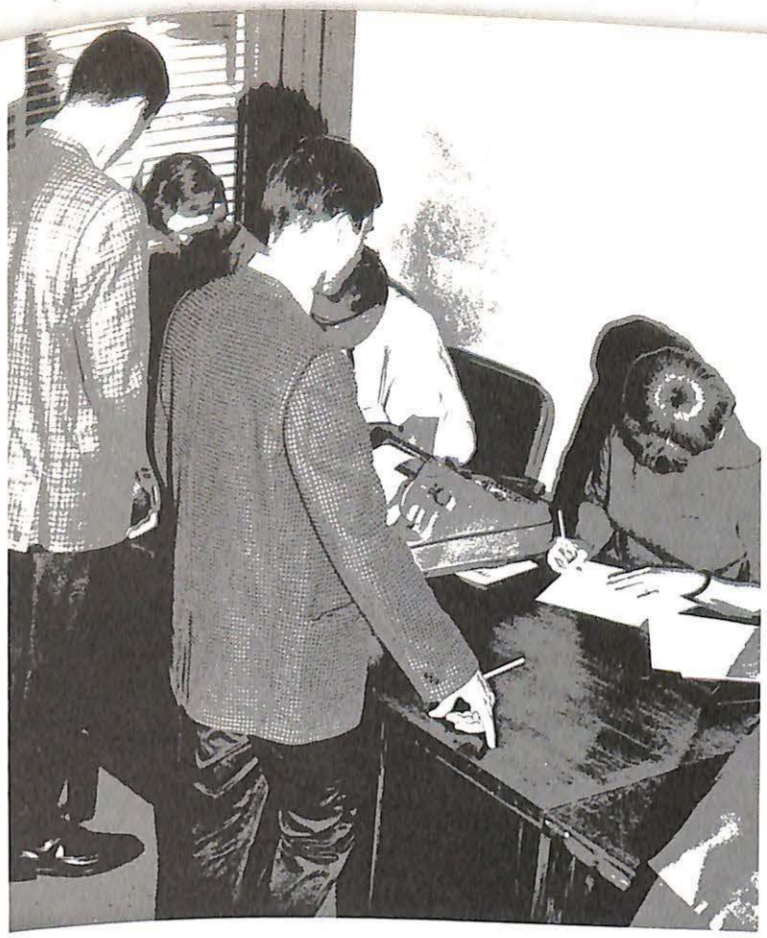

DEANS TWEITO, ASHFORD AND BROCK Share Variety of Functioning Roles.

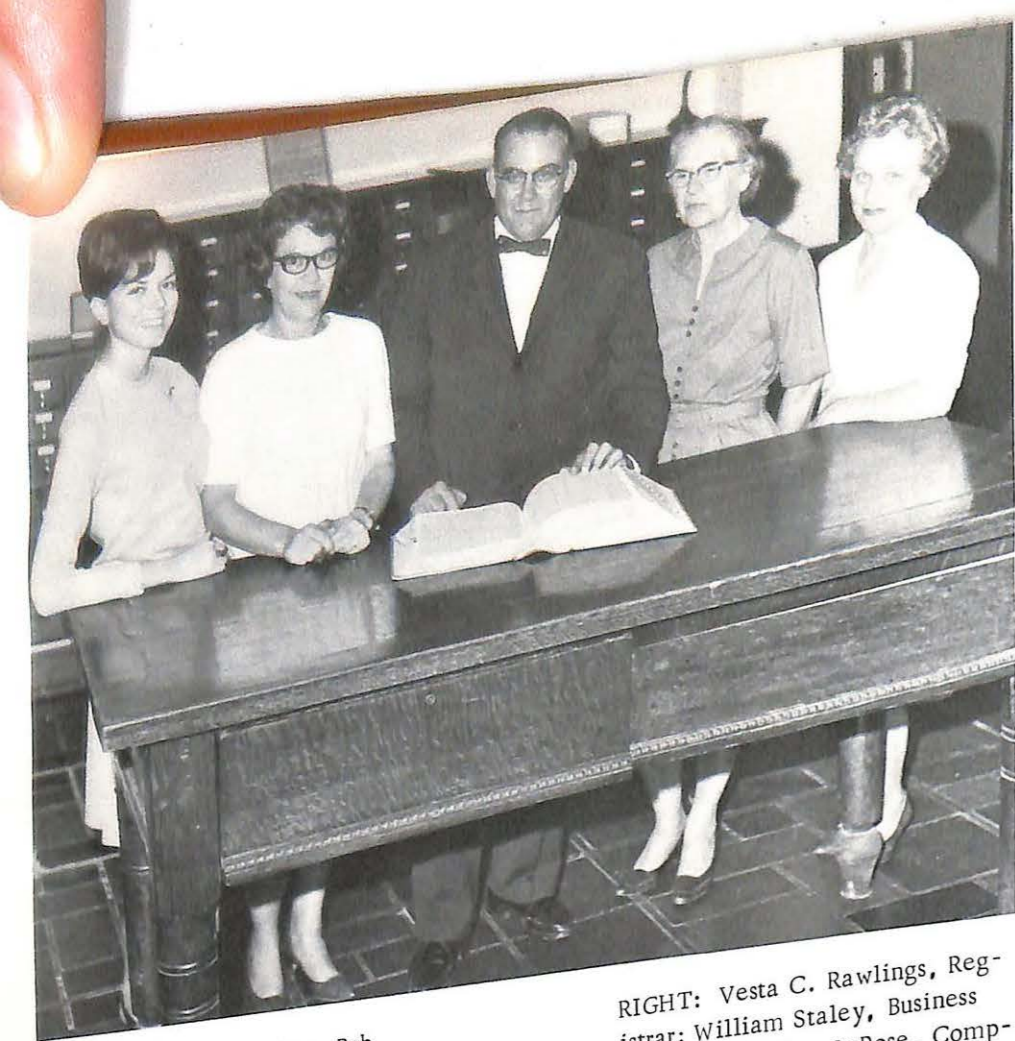

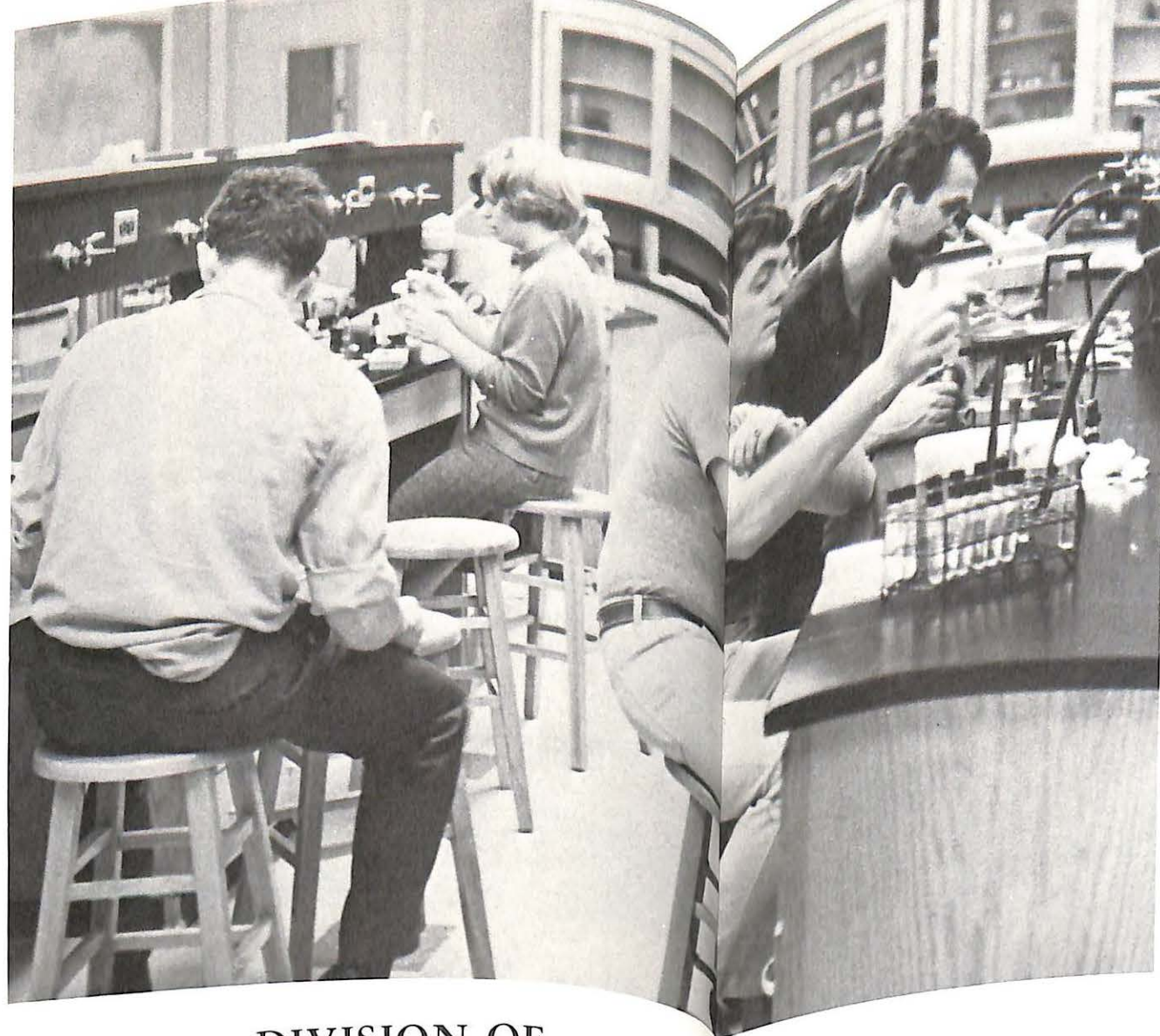

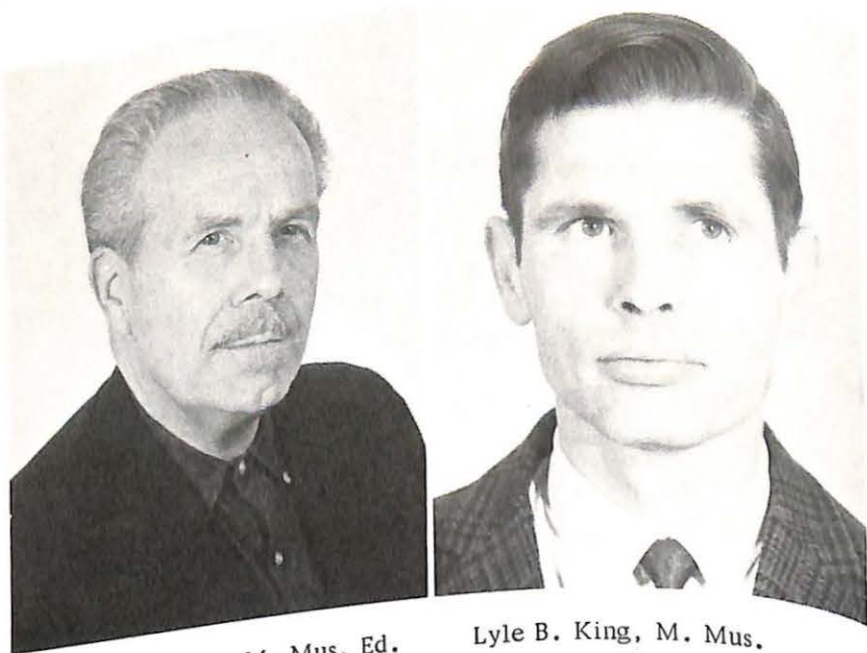

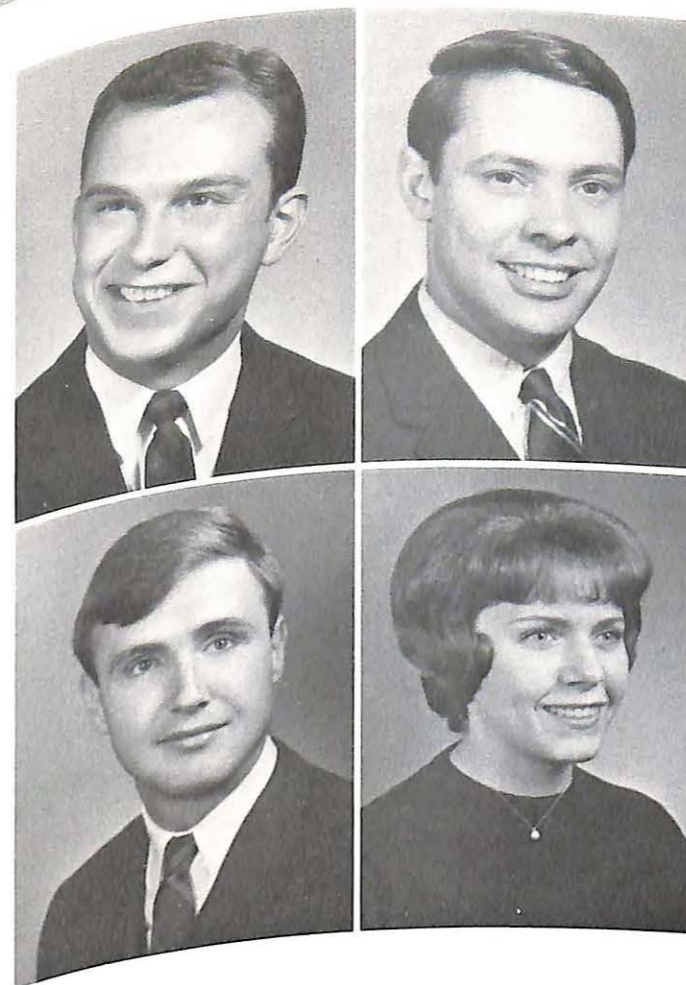

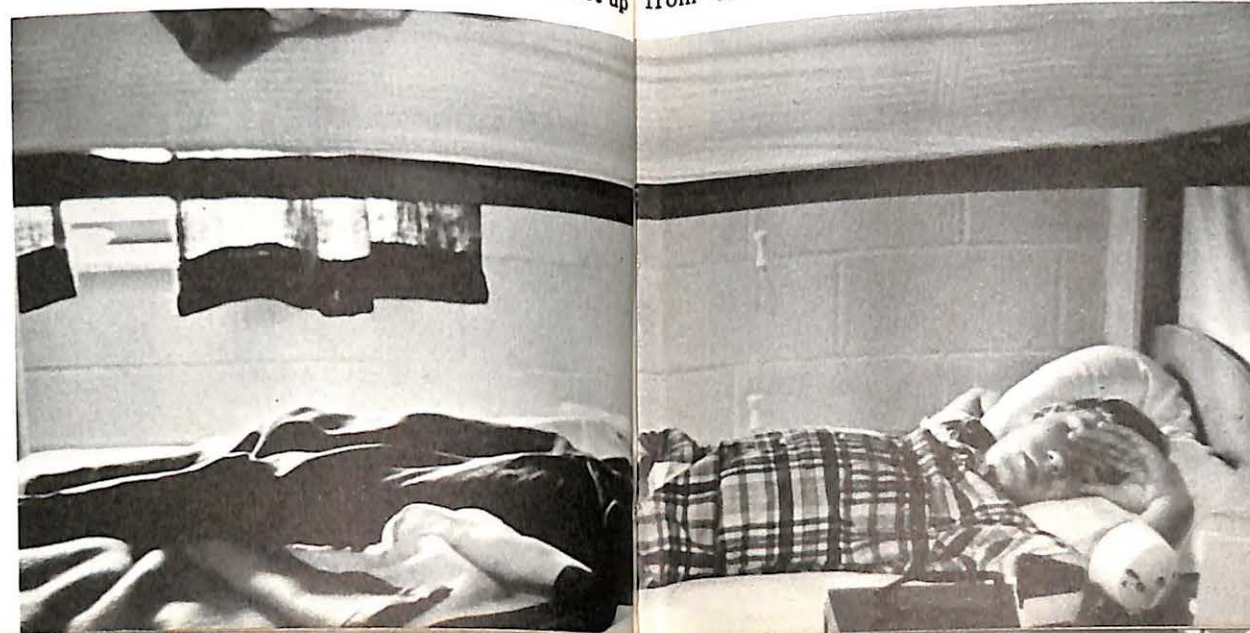

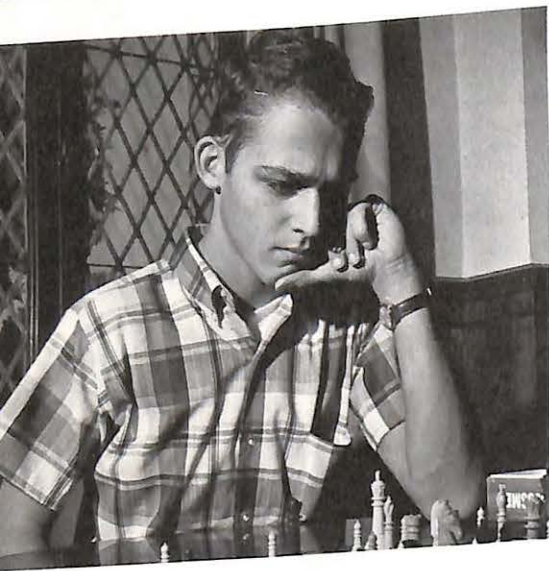

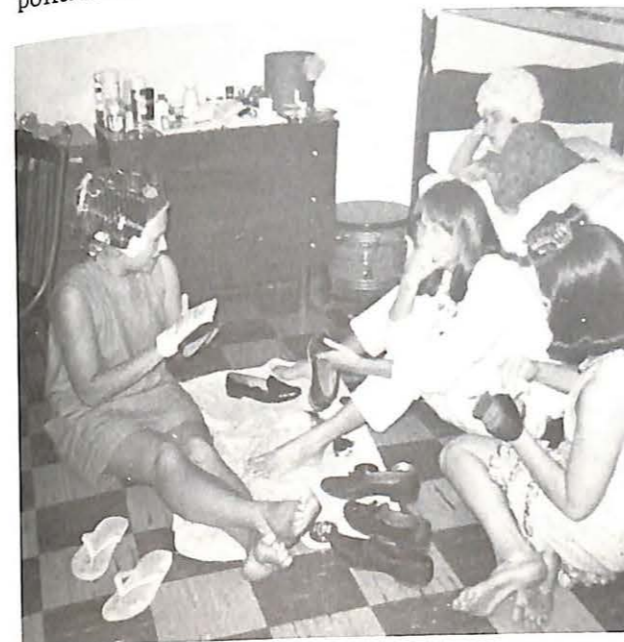

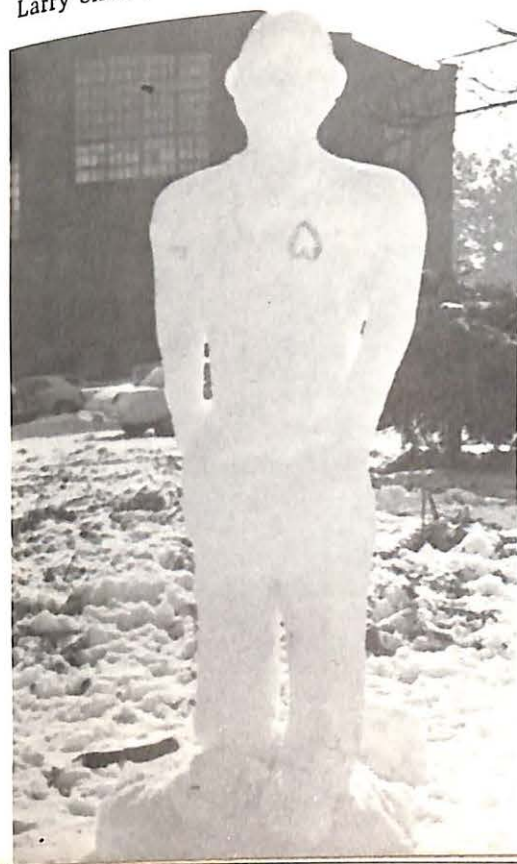

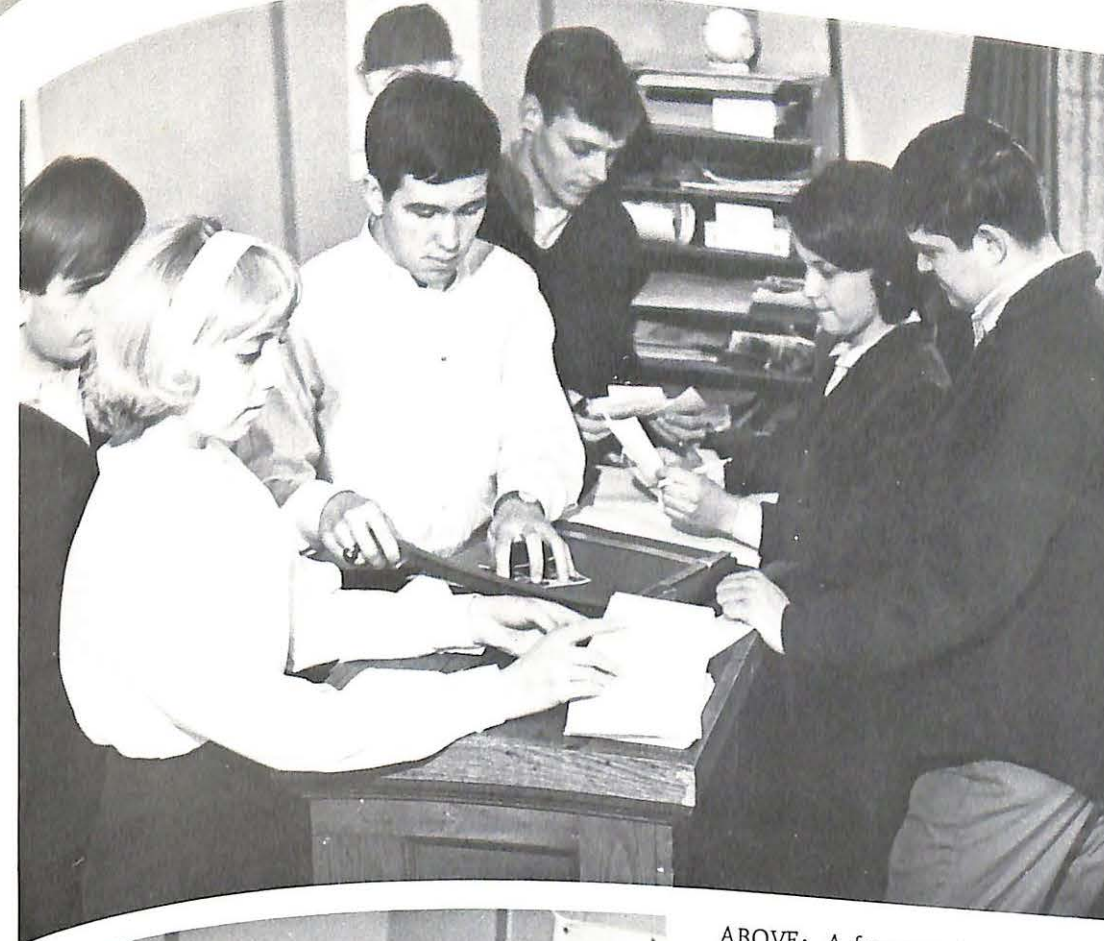

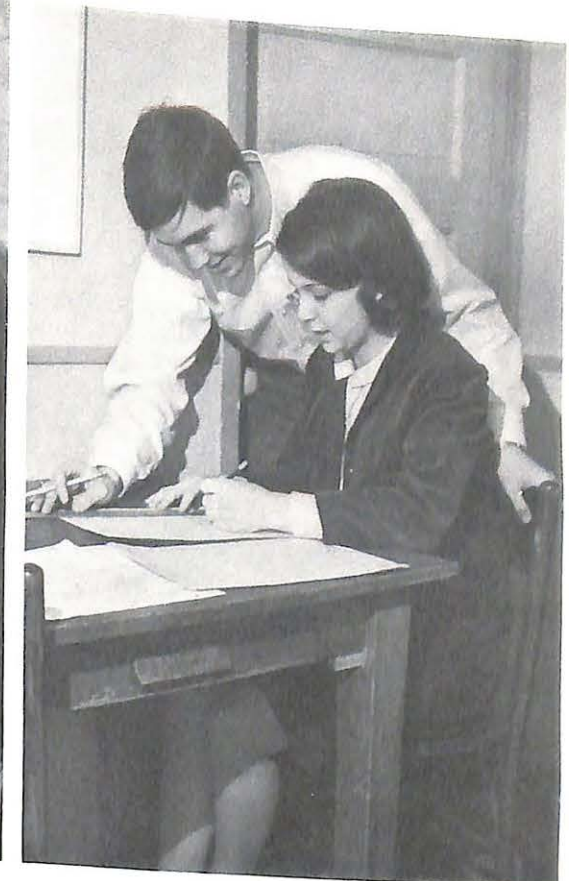

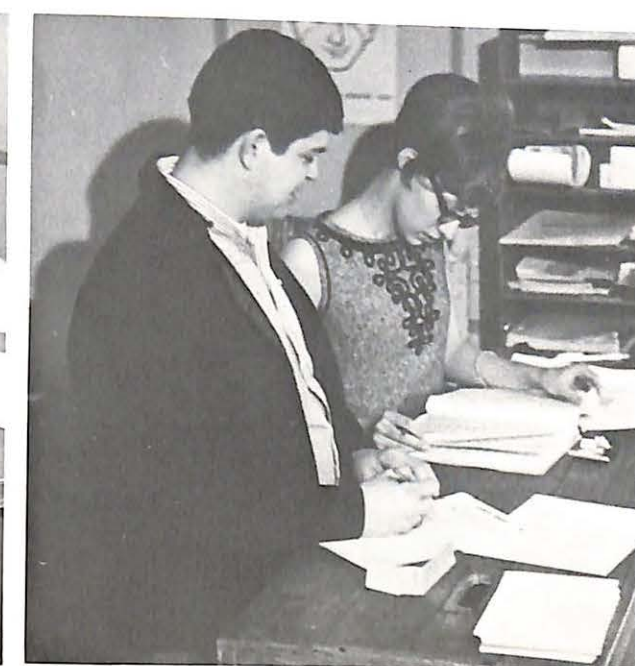

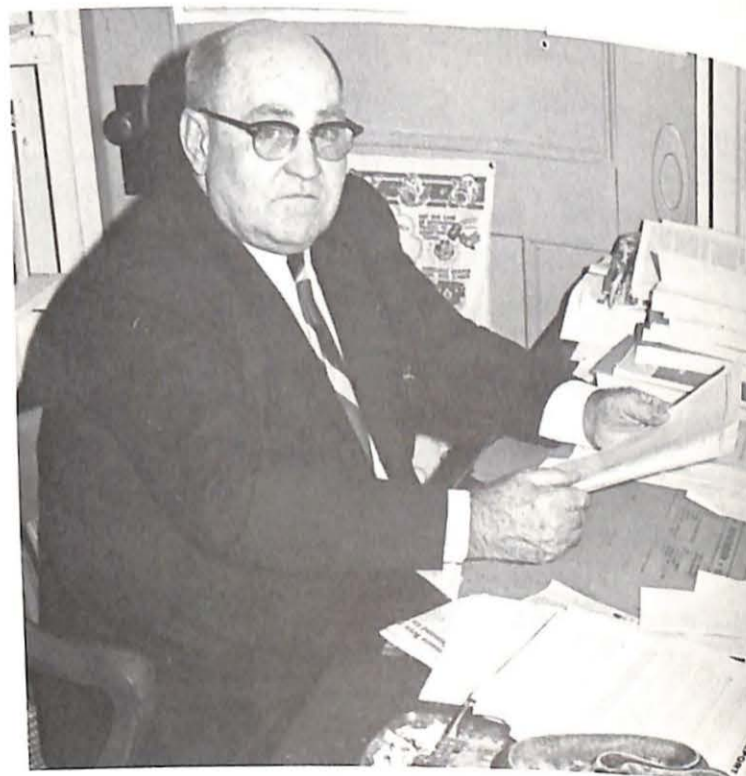

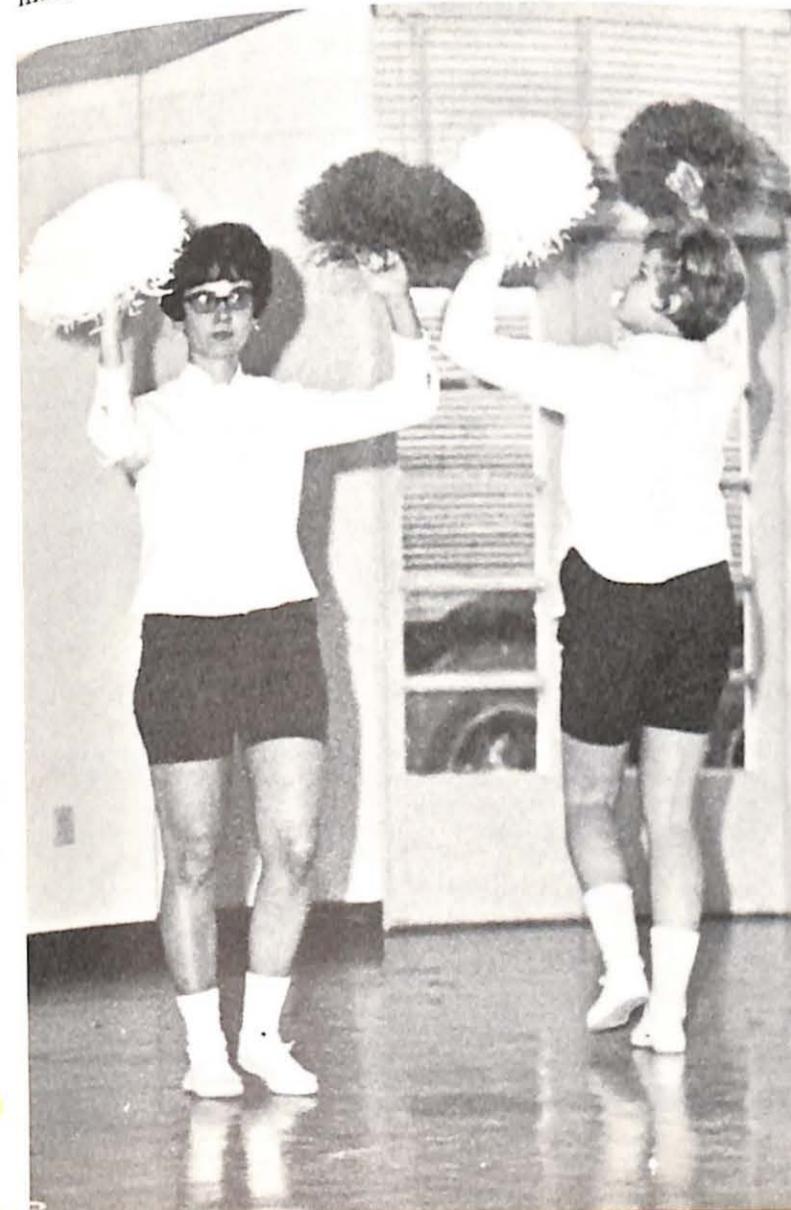

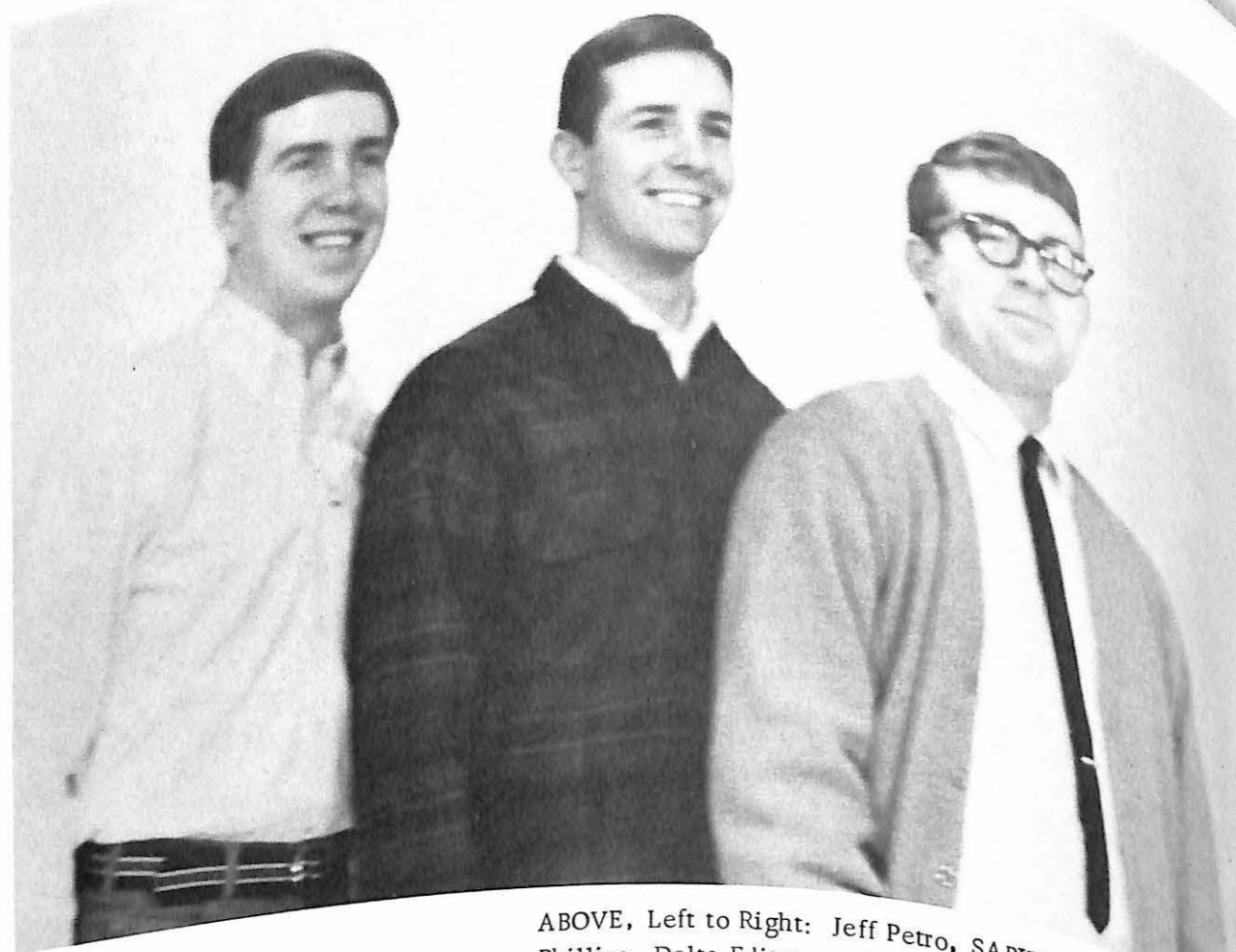

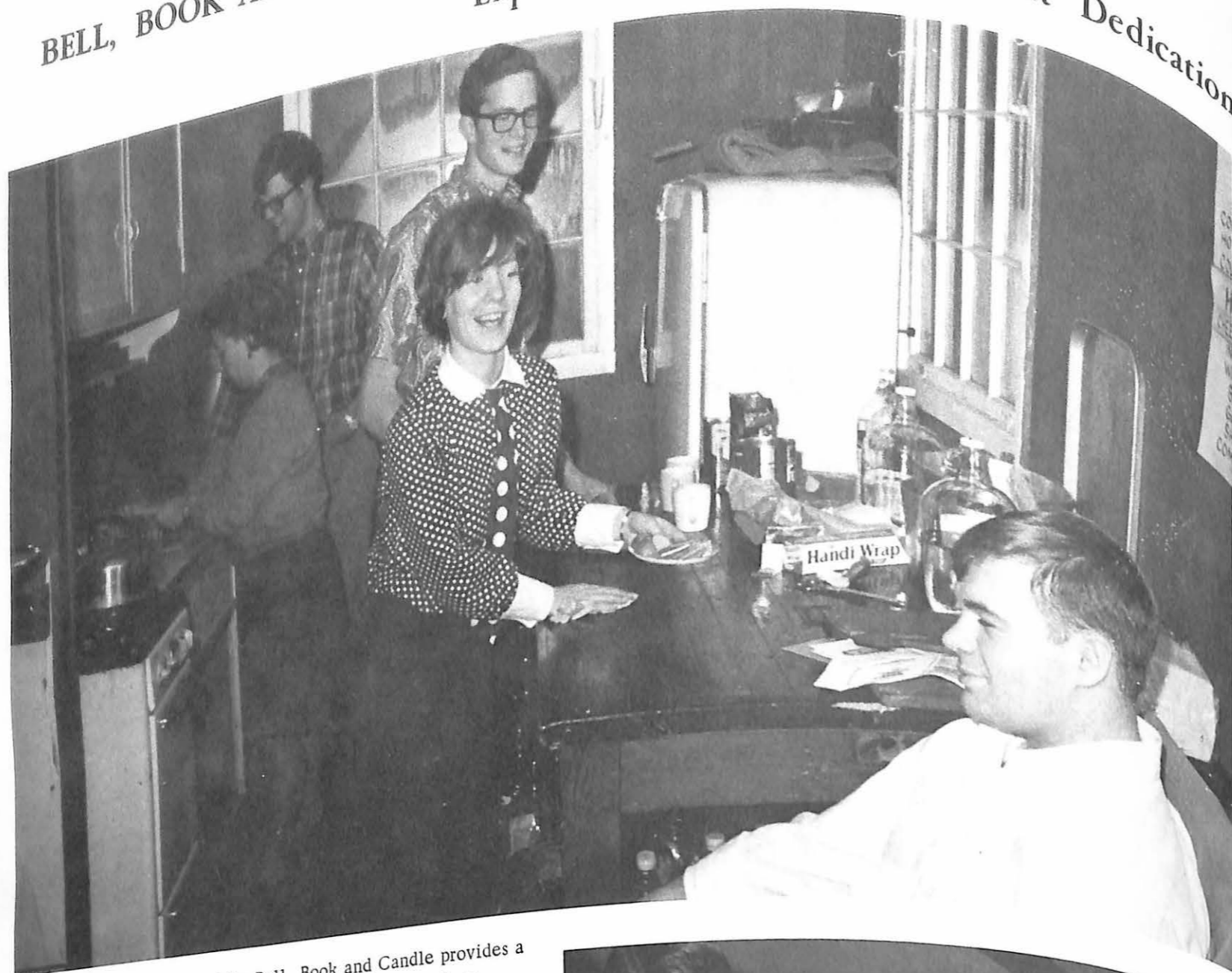

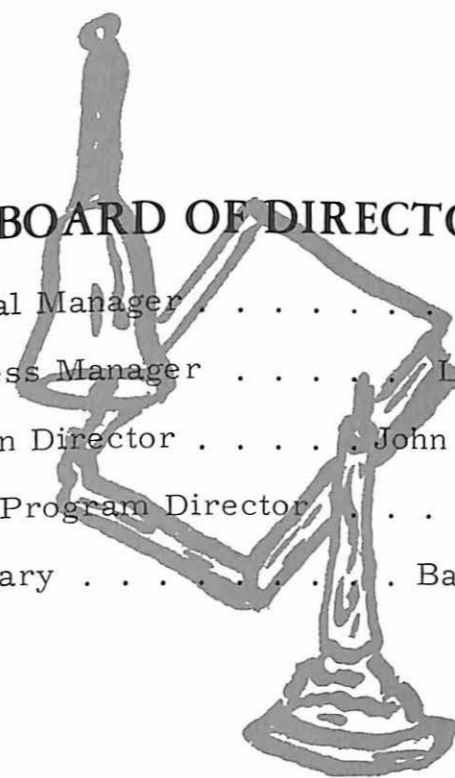

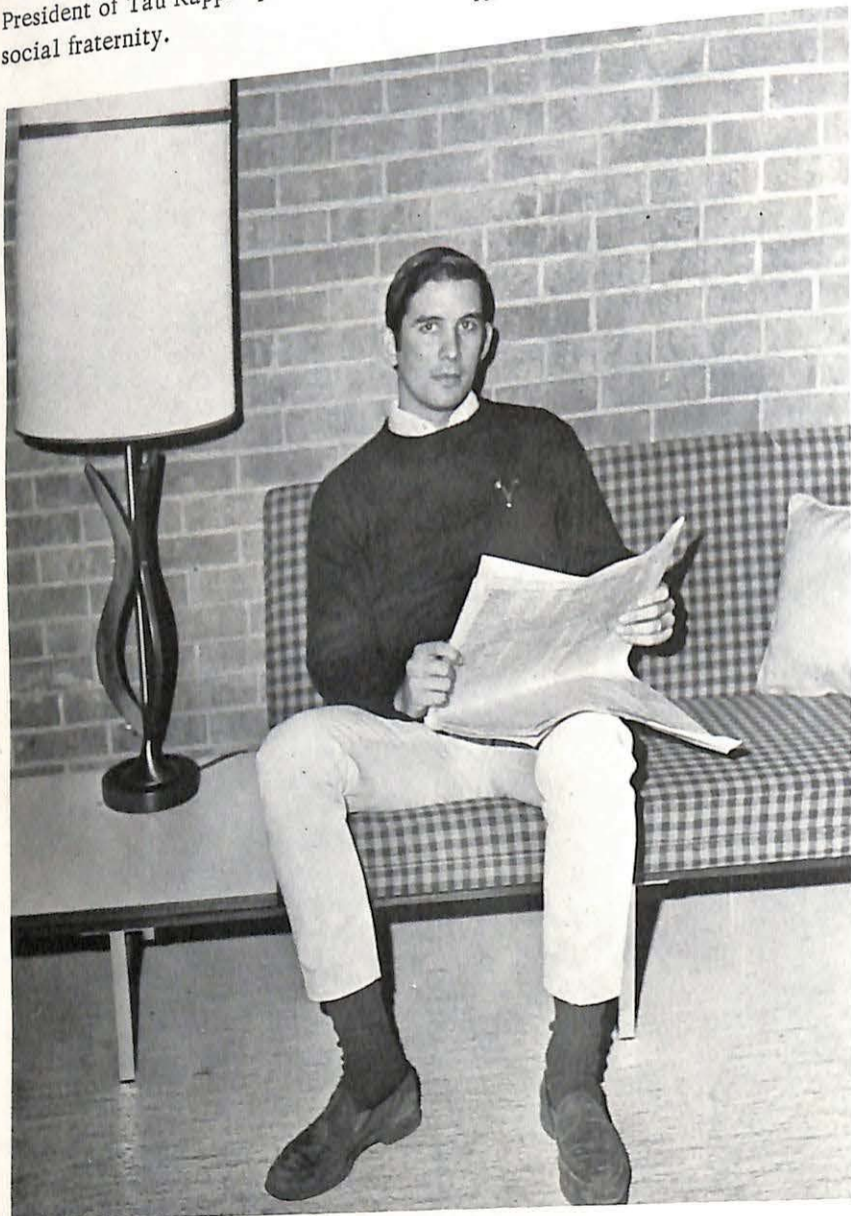

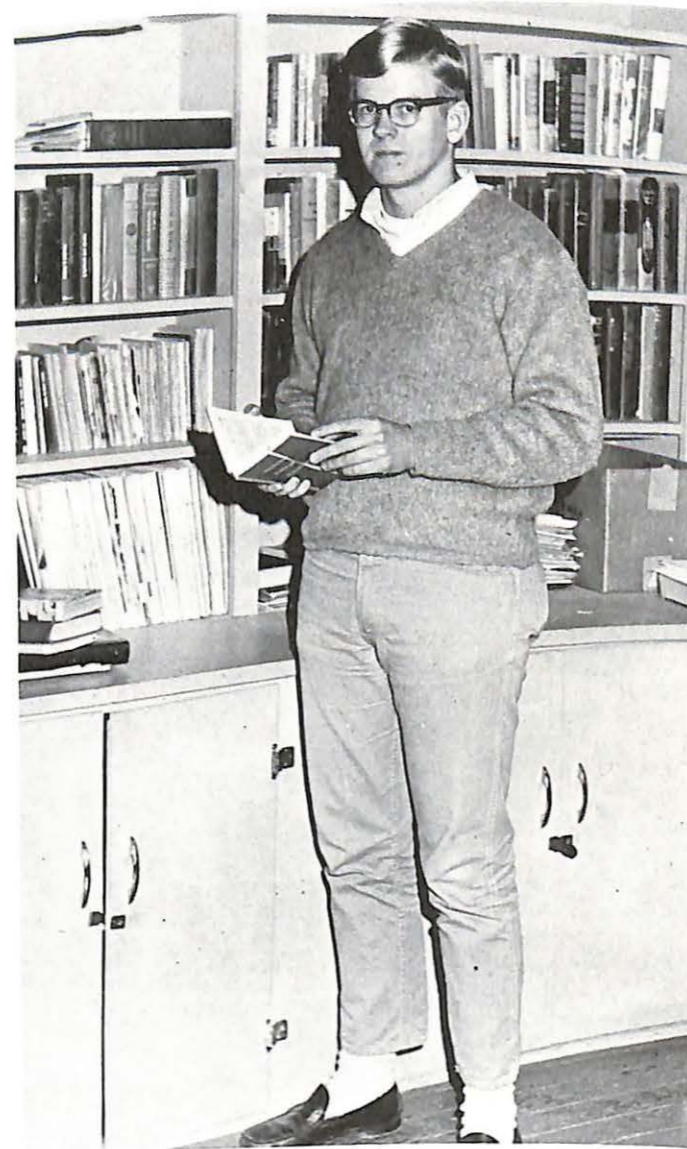

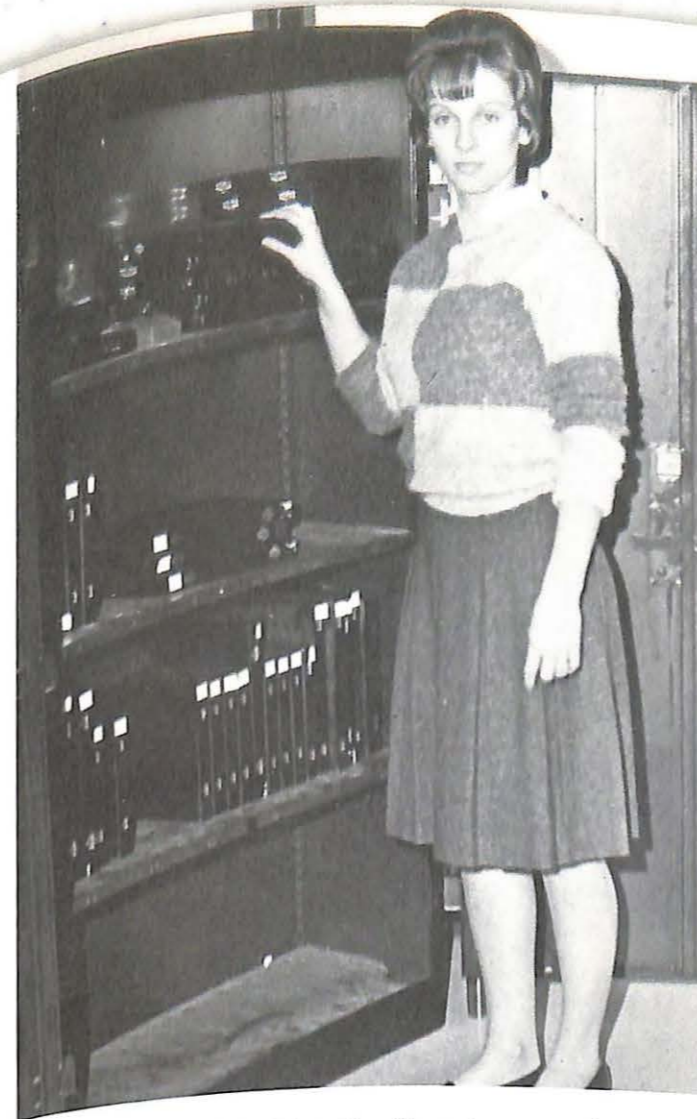

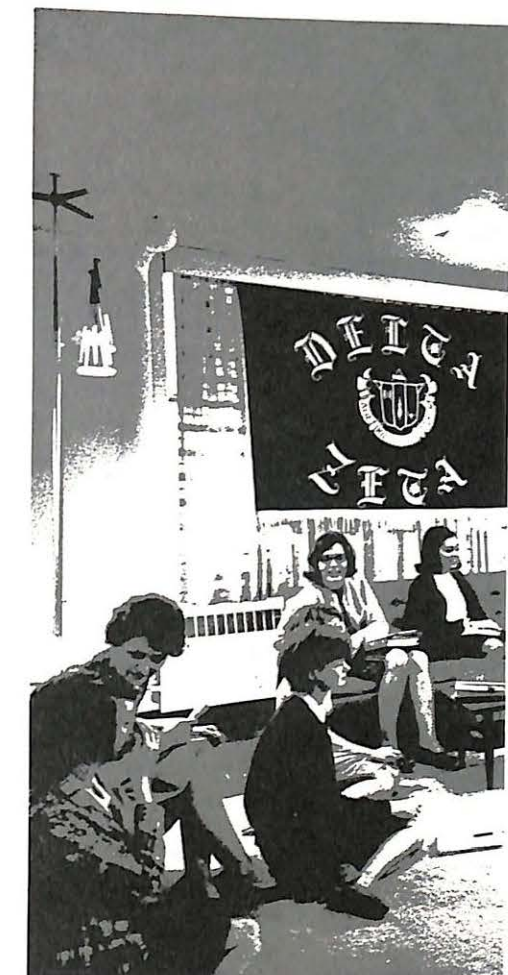

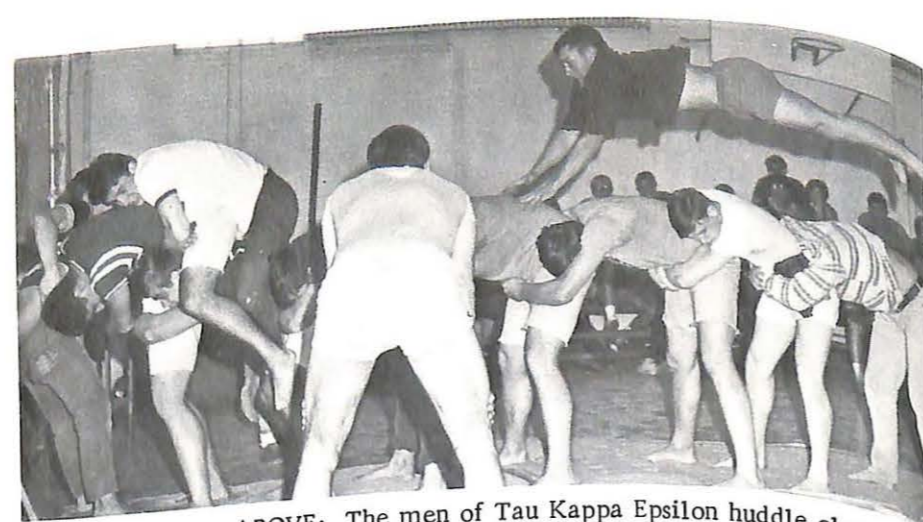

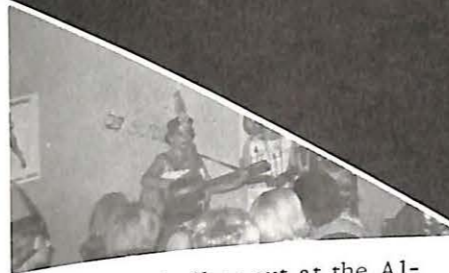

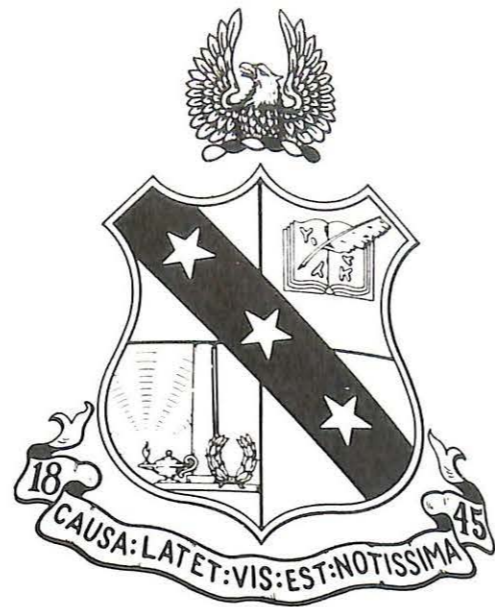

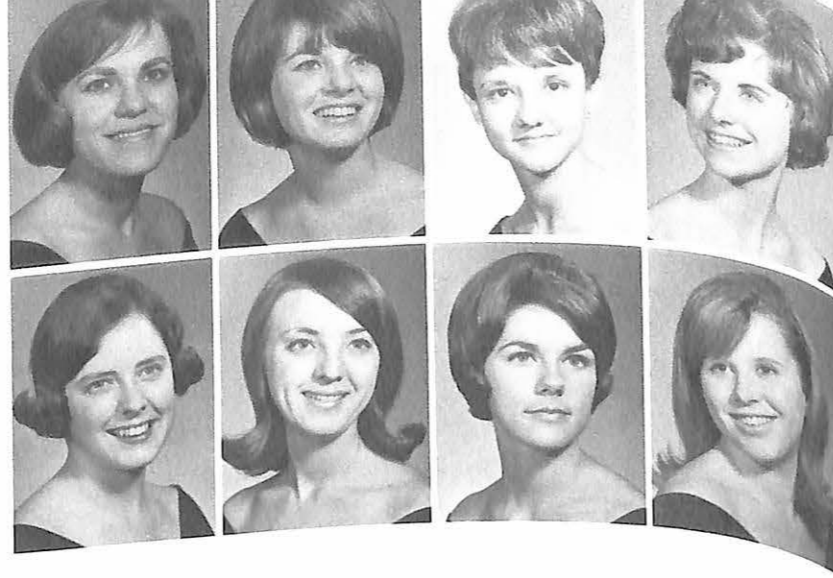

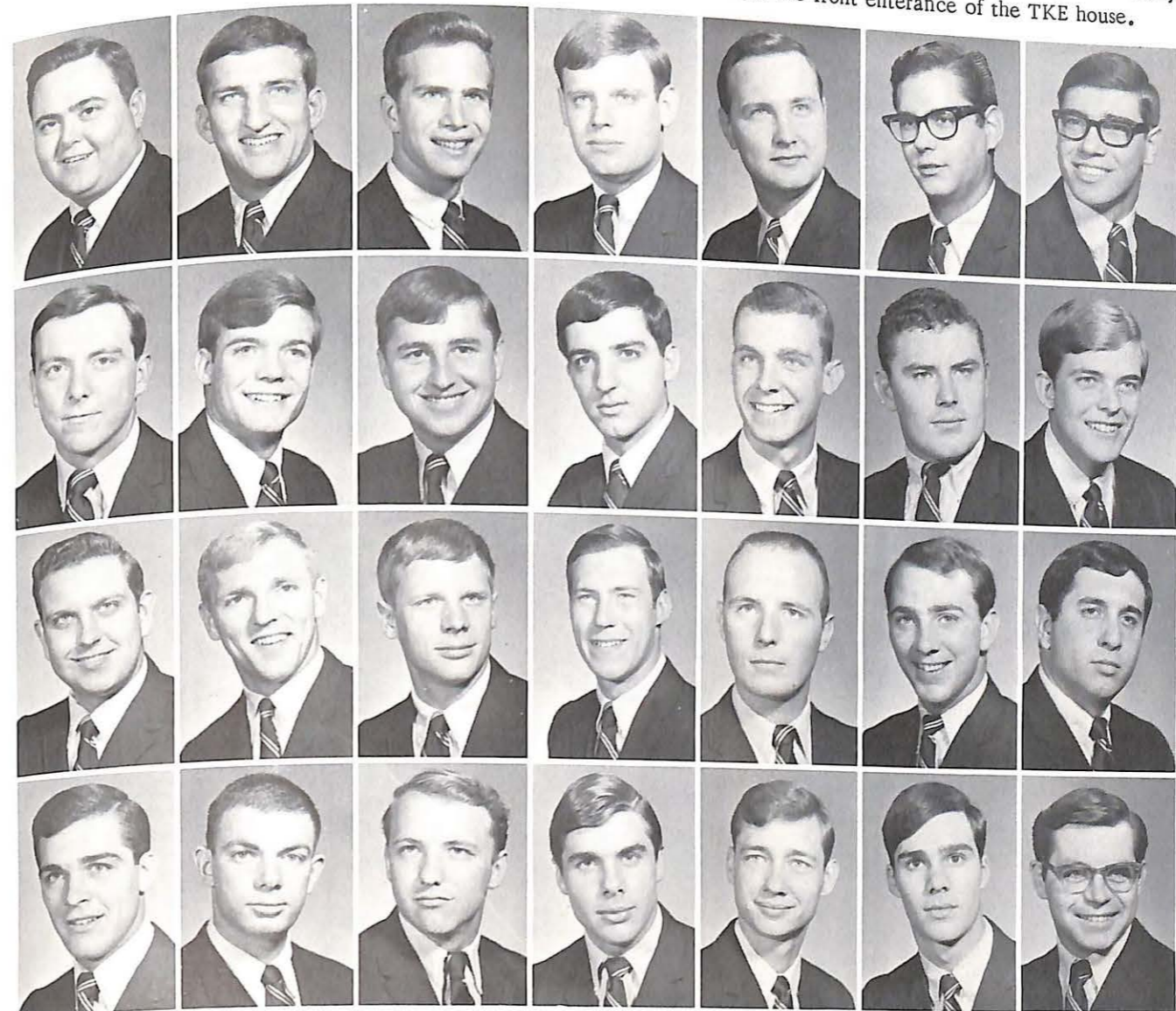

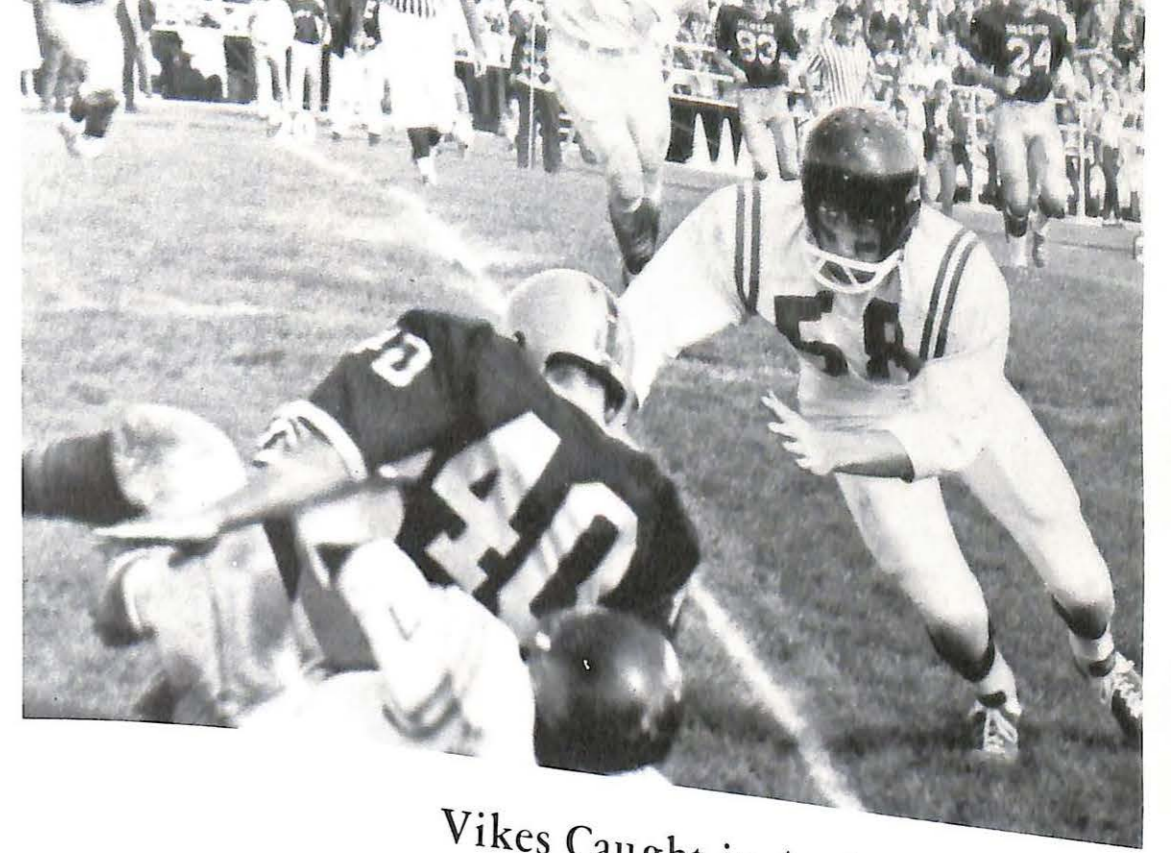

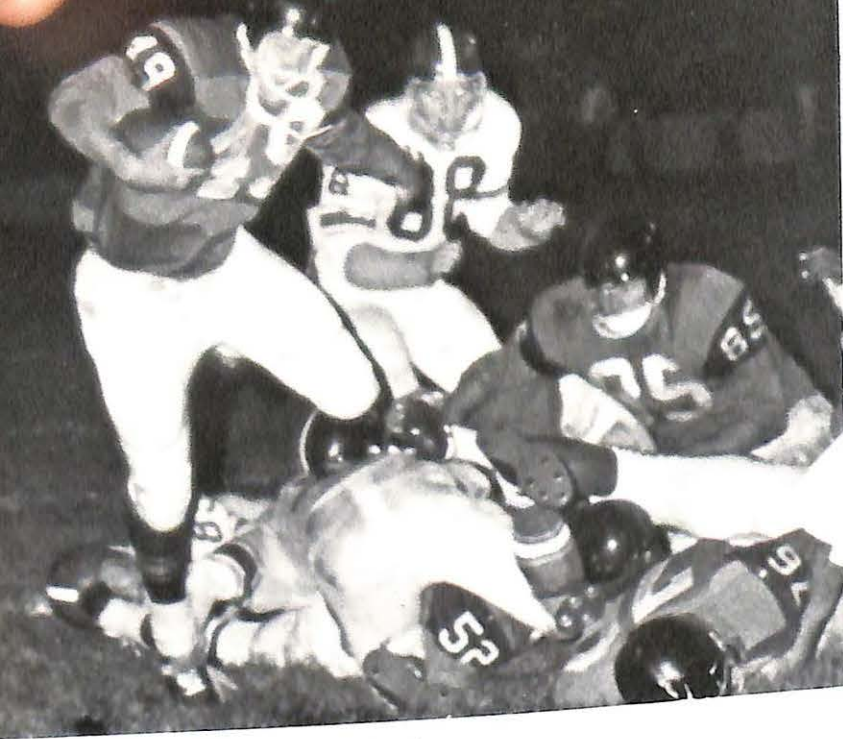

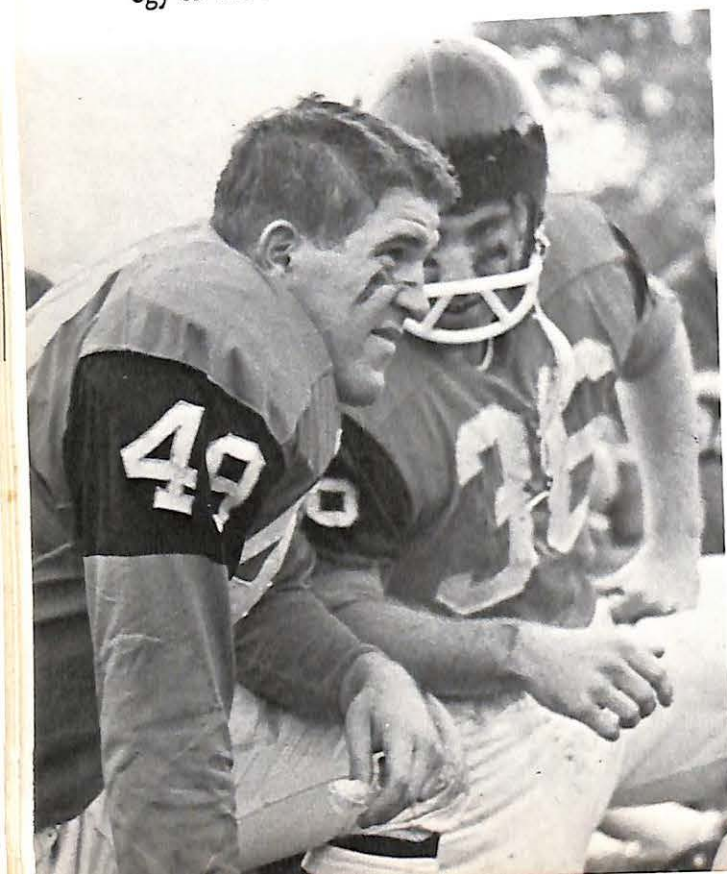




Prediction Fails: Valley Loses to Jewell

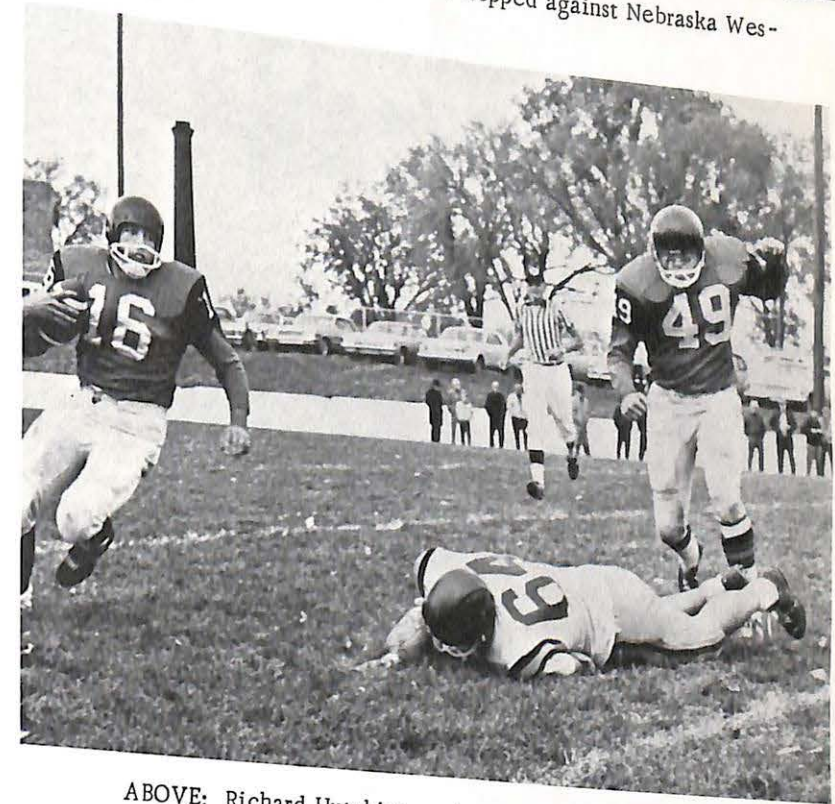

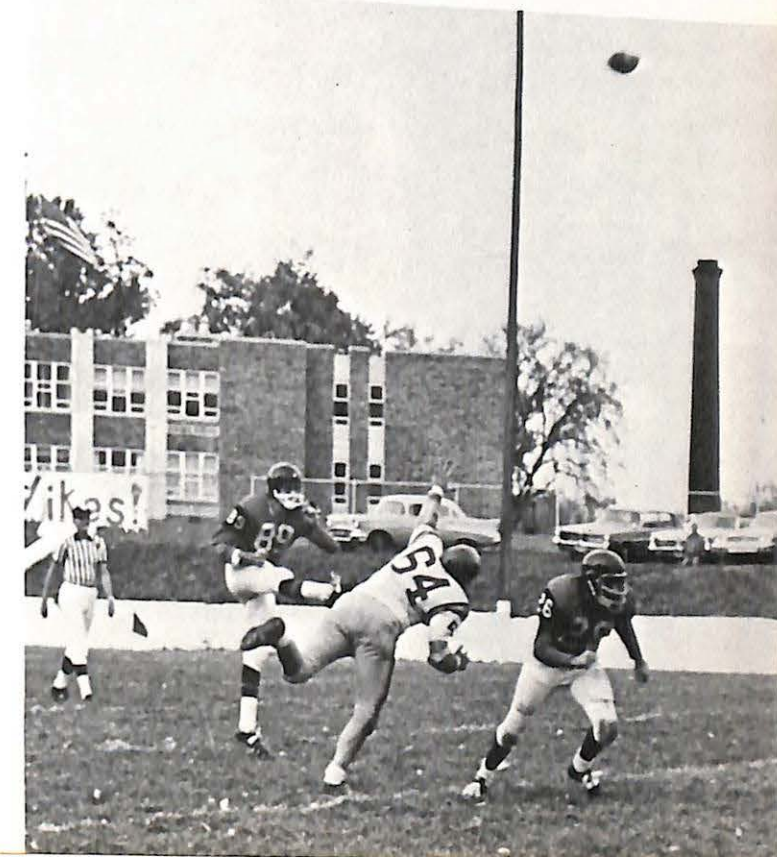

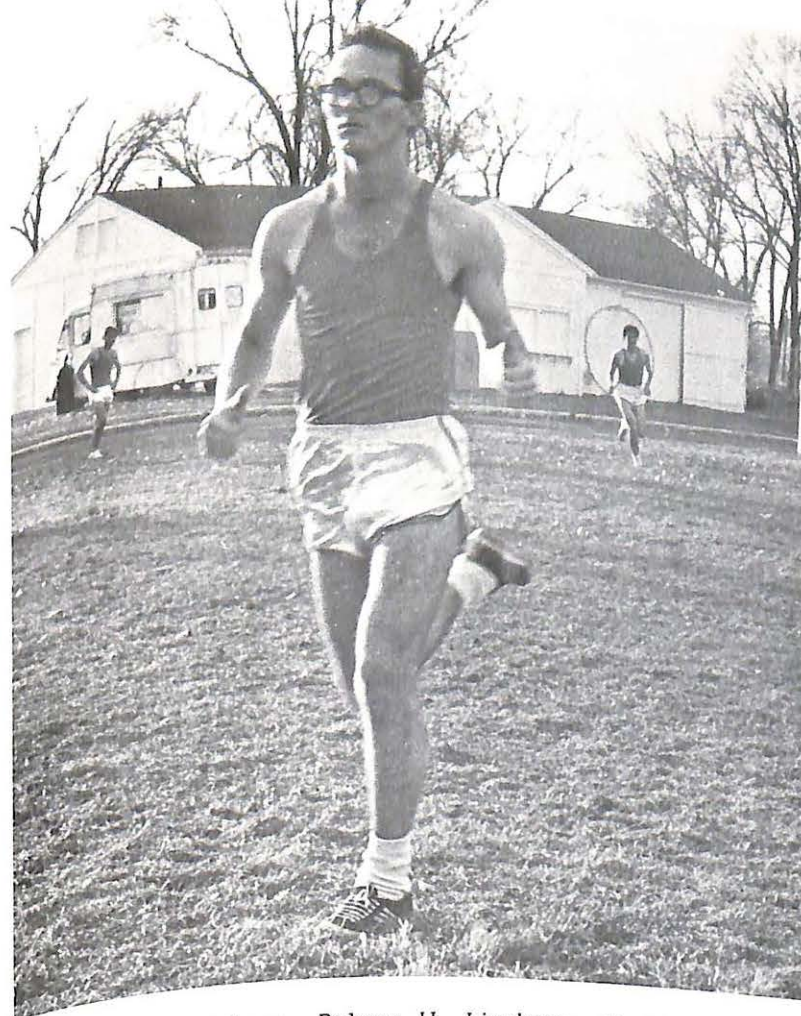

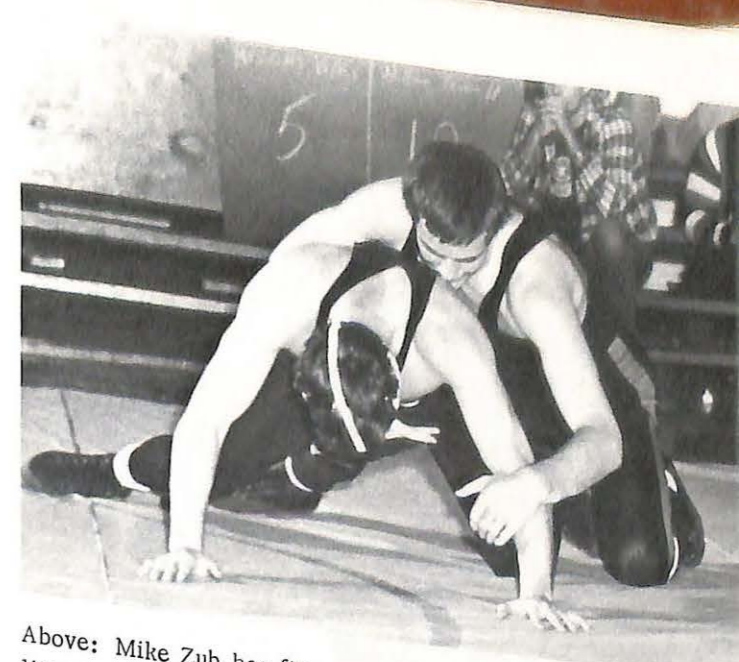

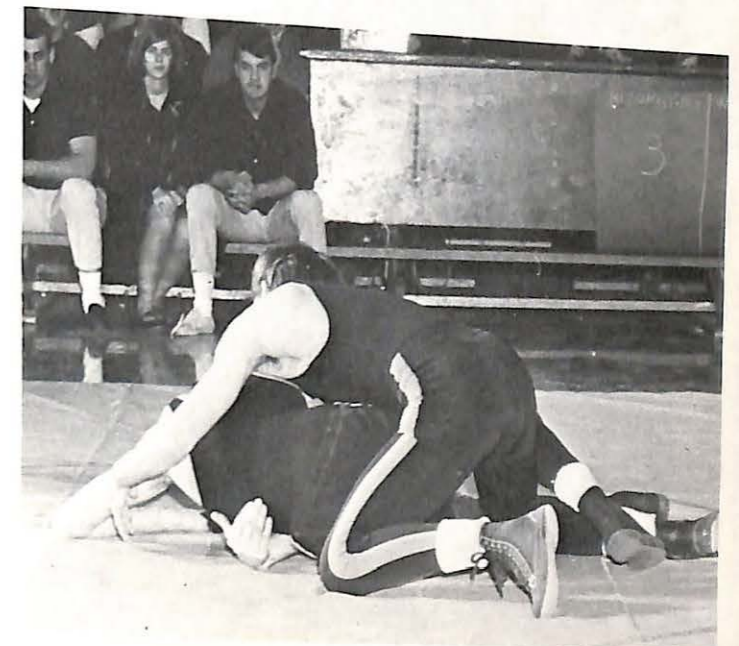

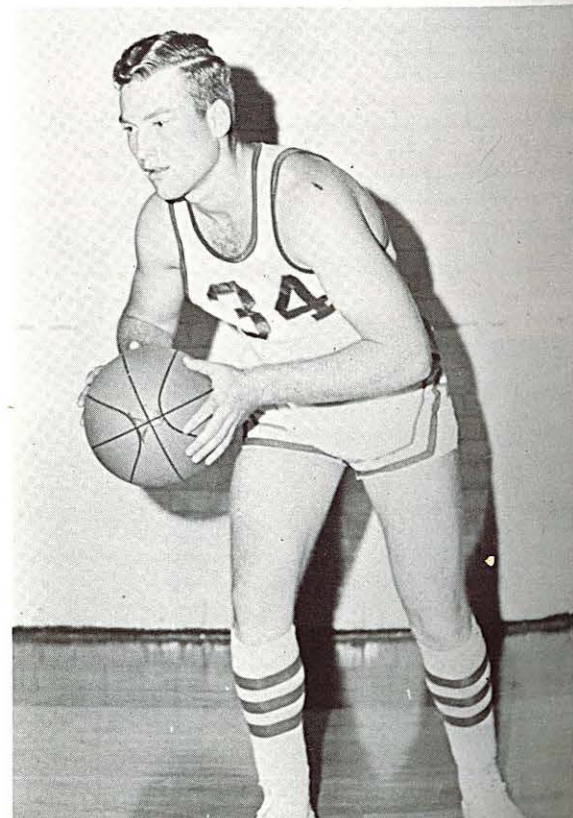

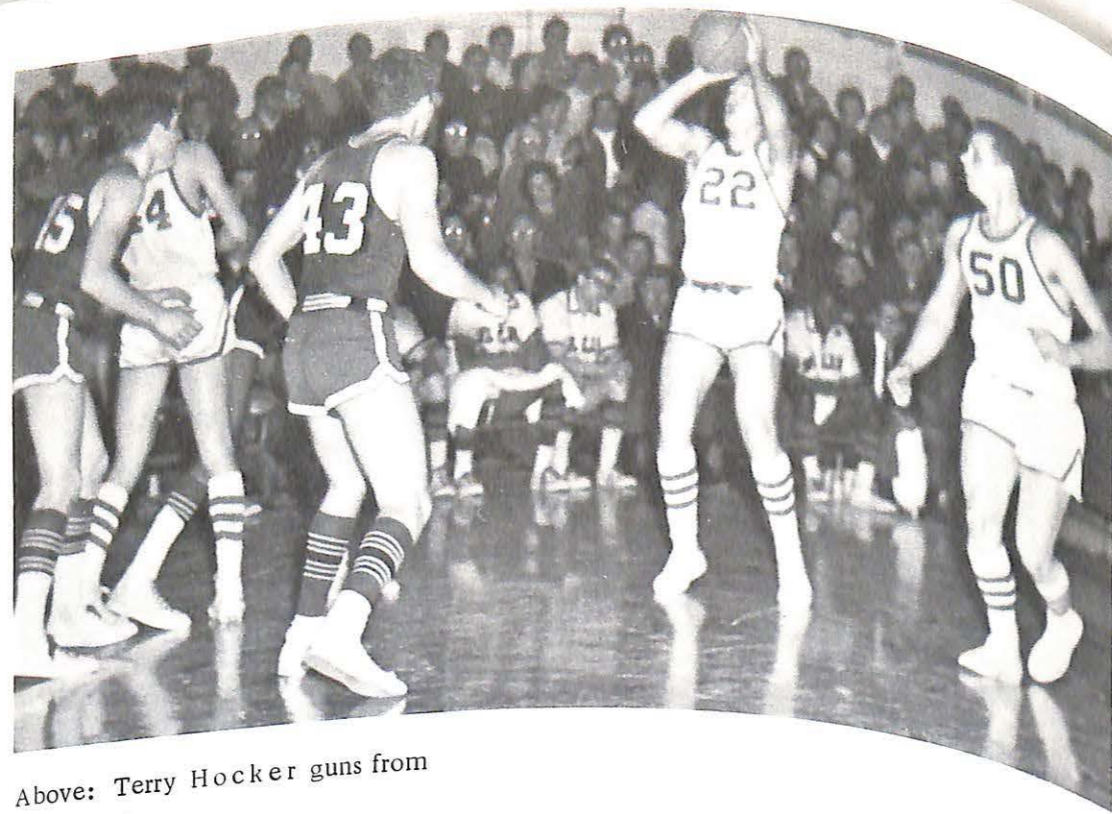


Holiday Tournament

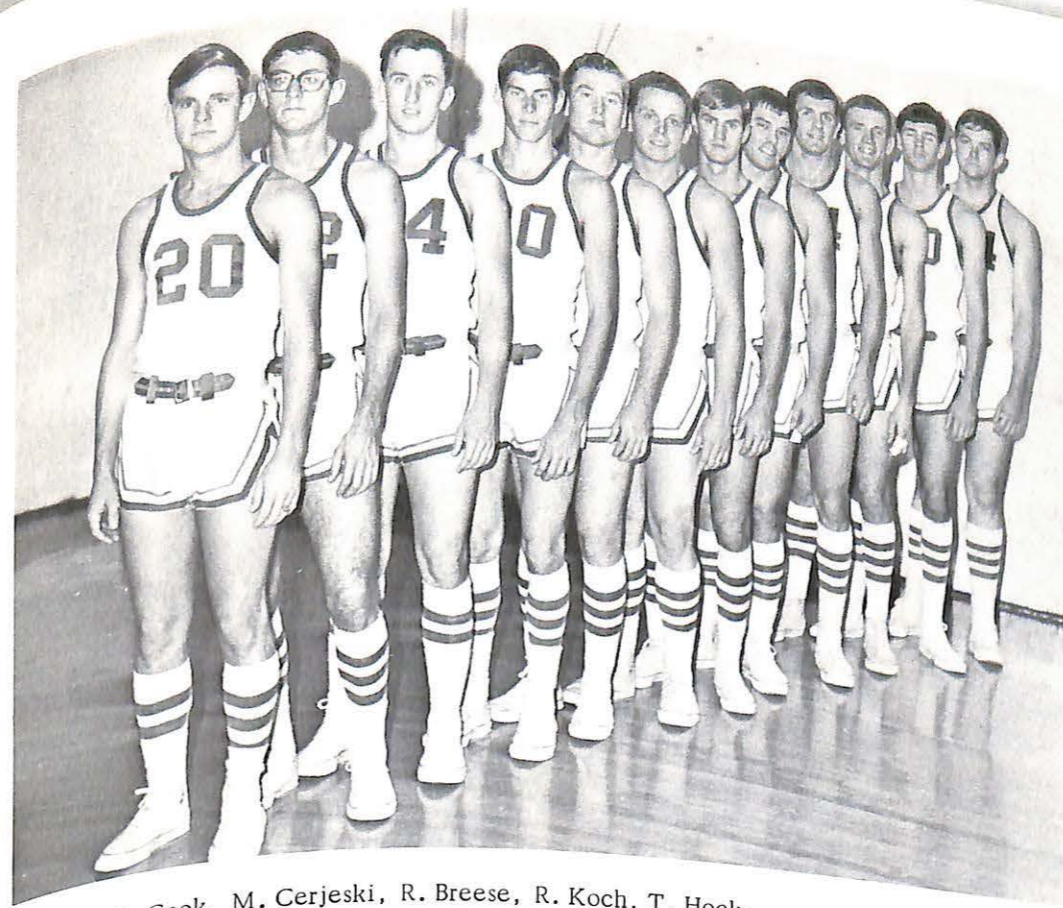

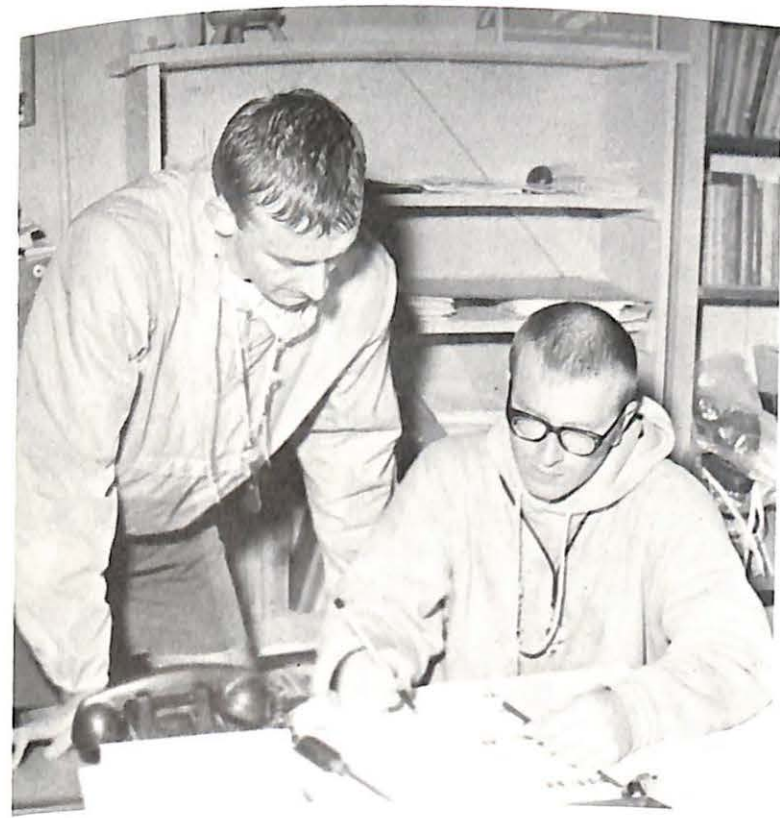


Spirit Reigns

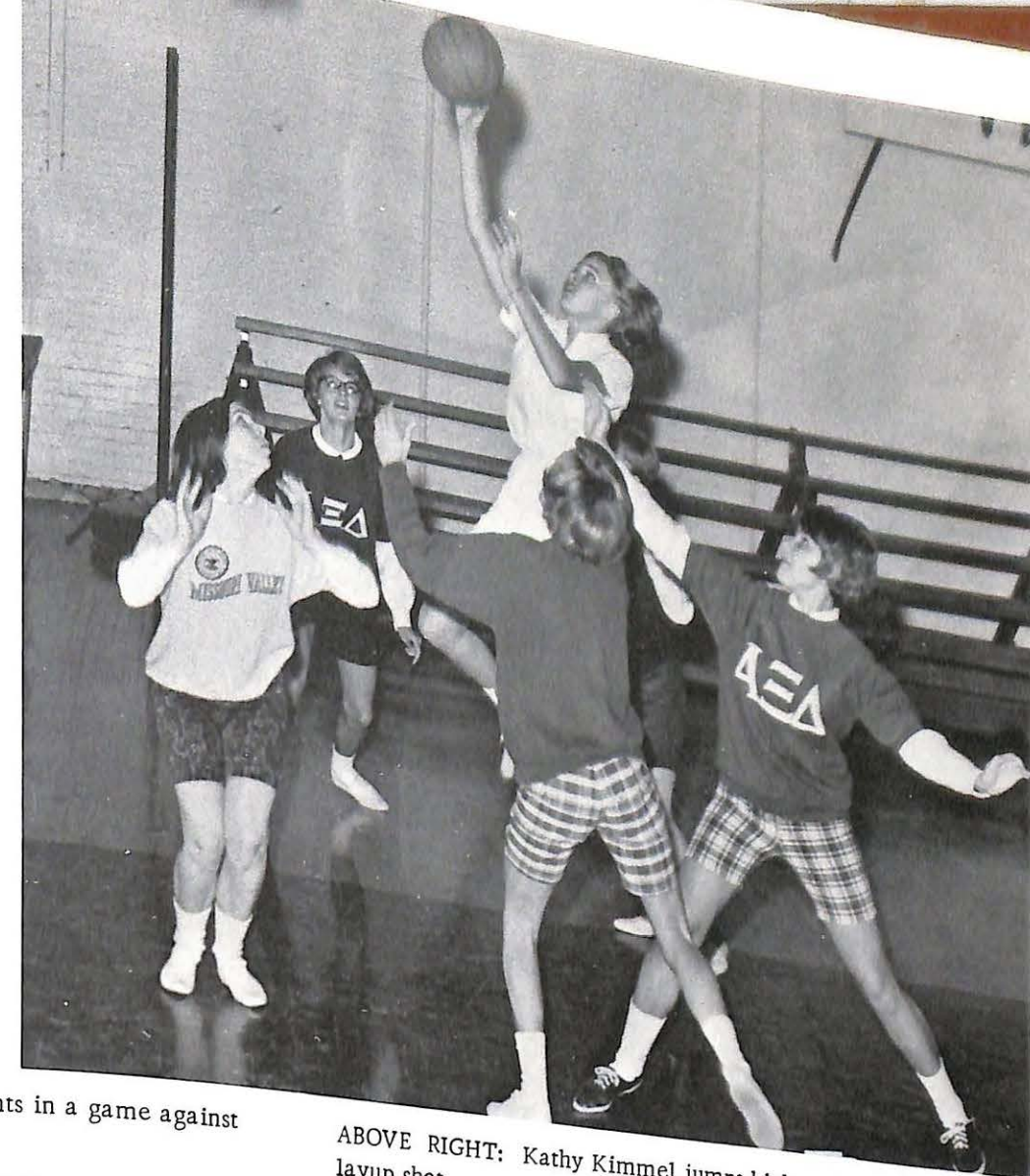

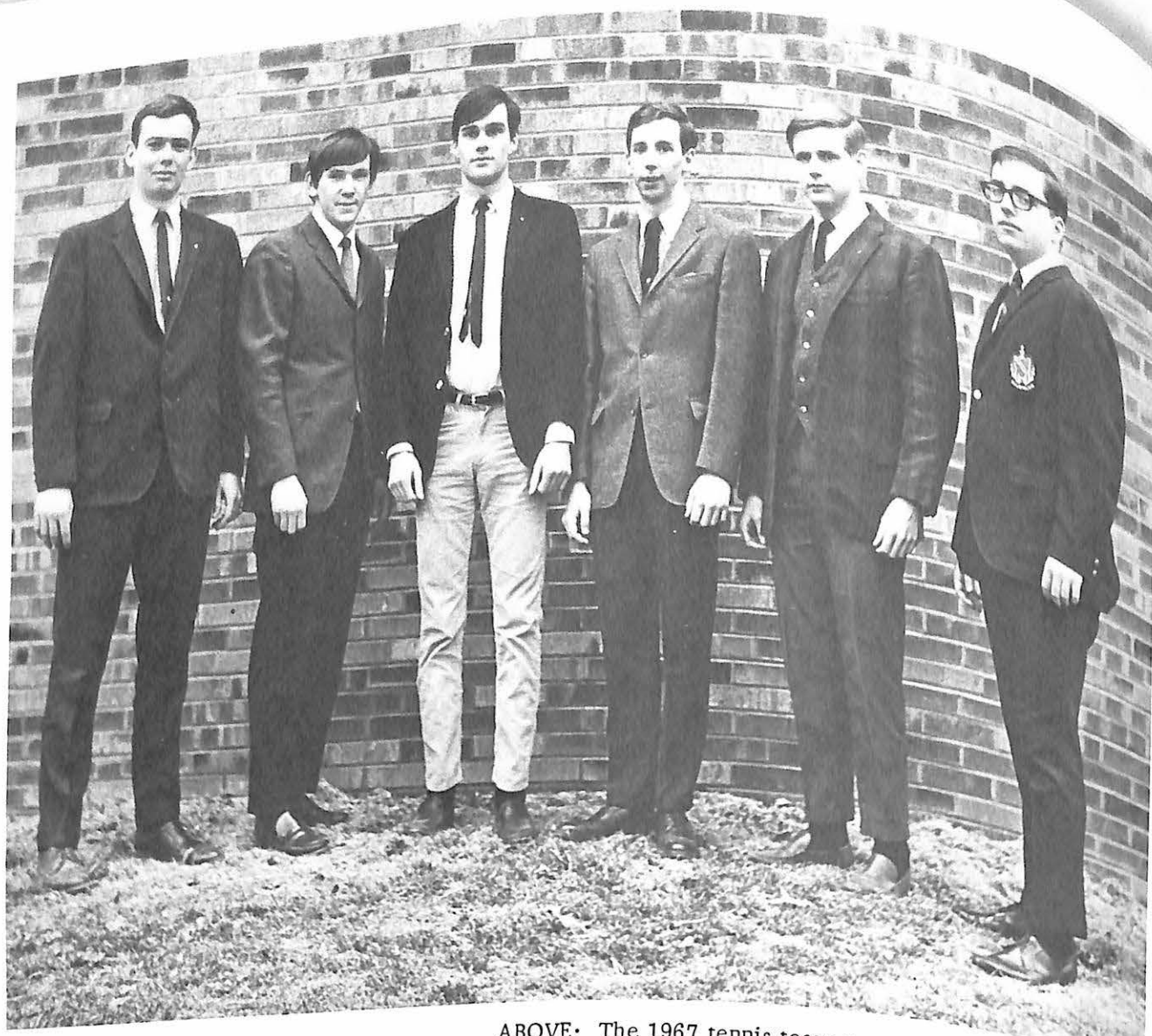

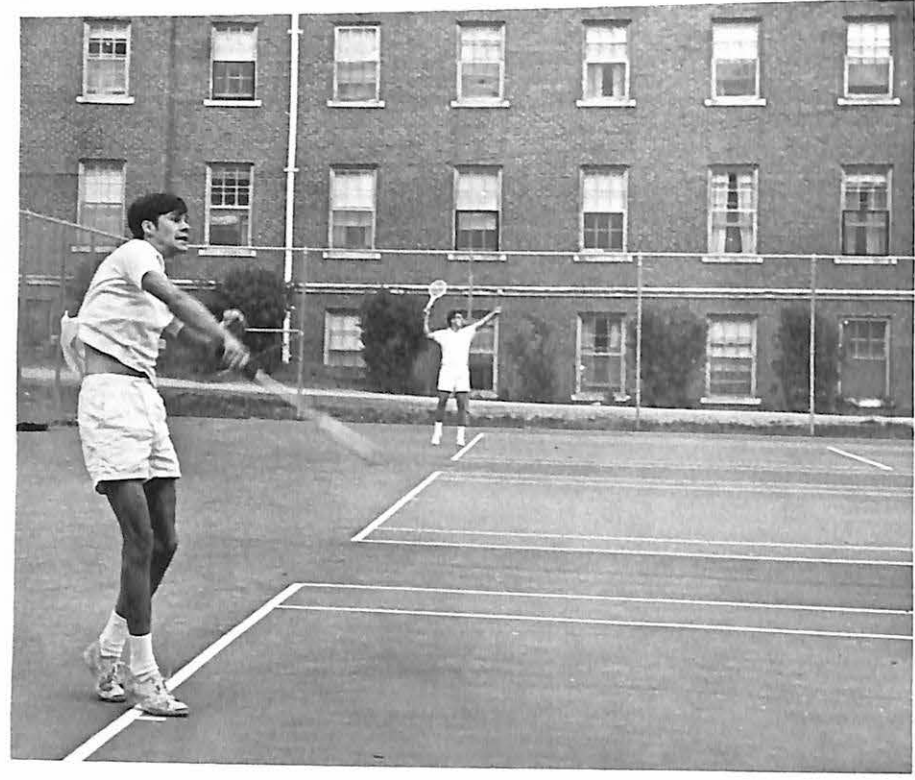

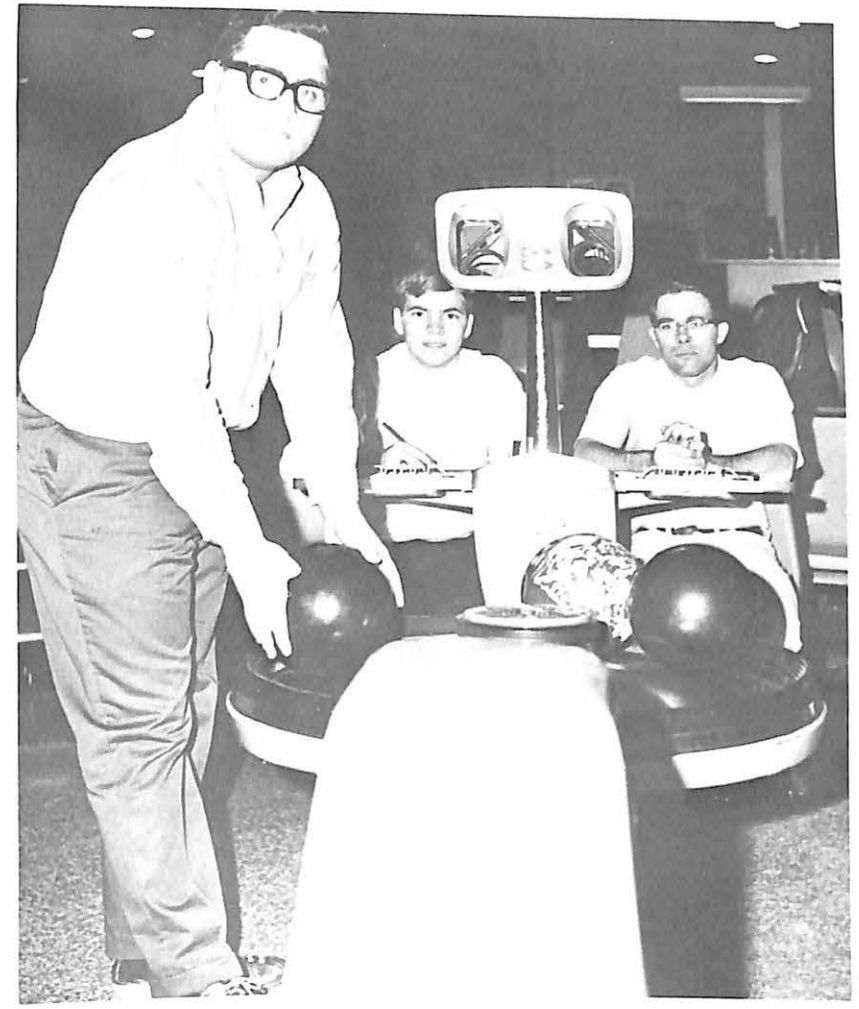

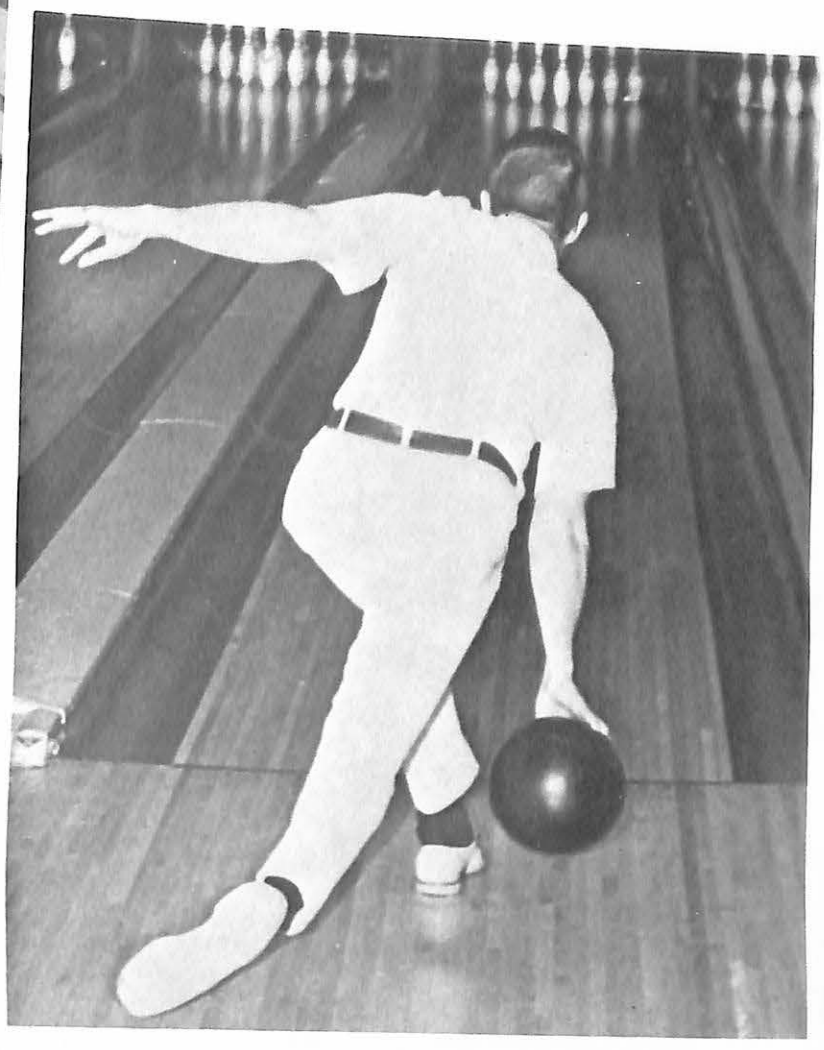

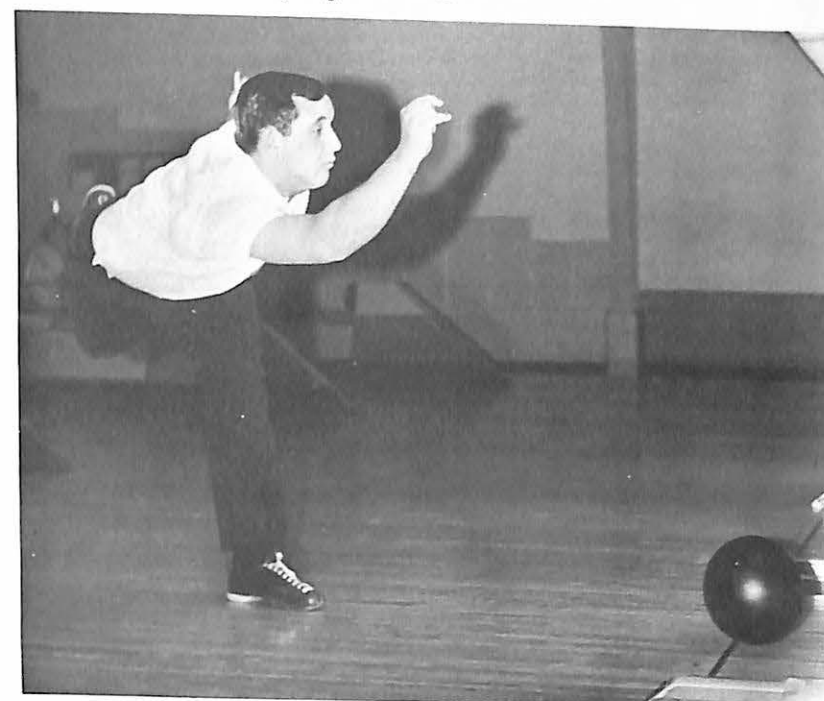

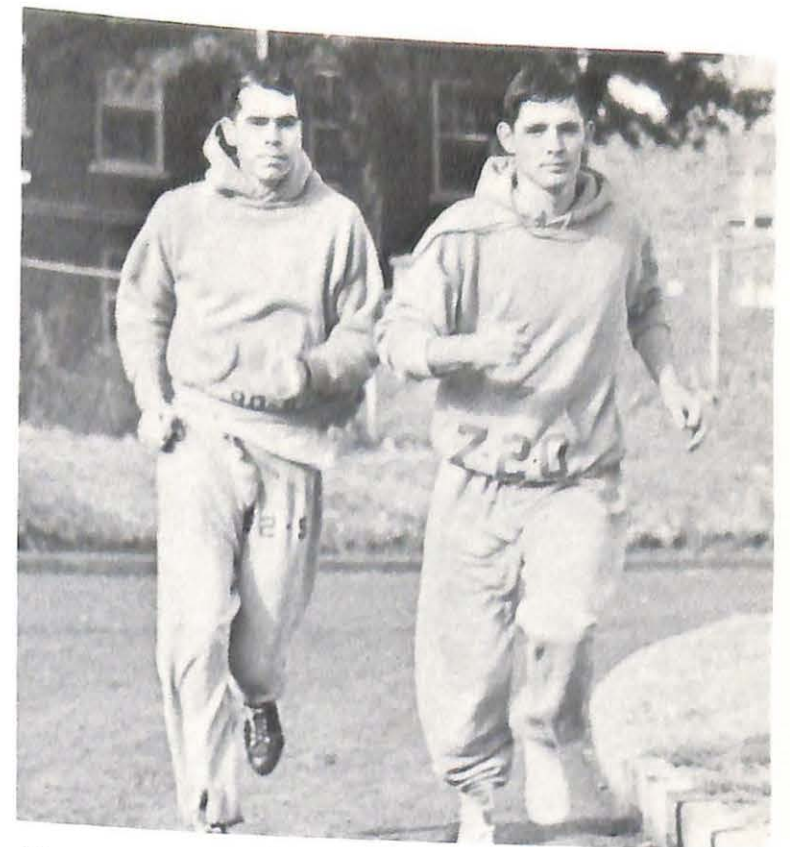

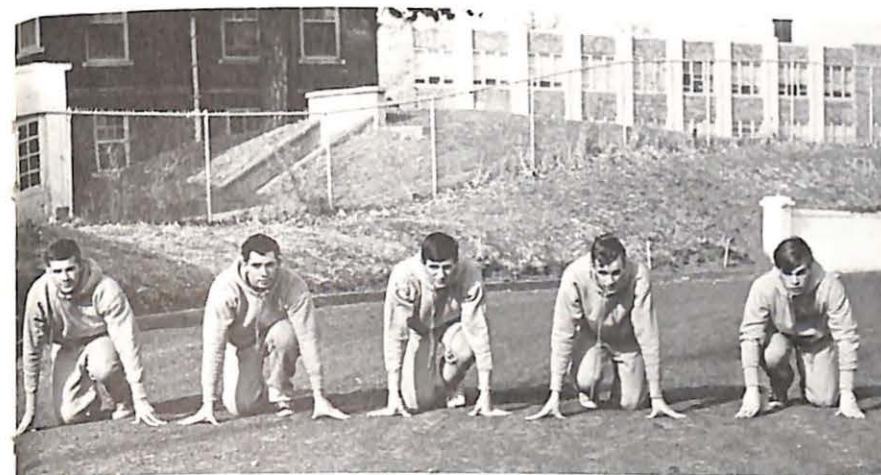

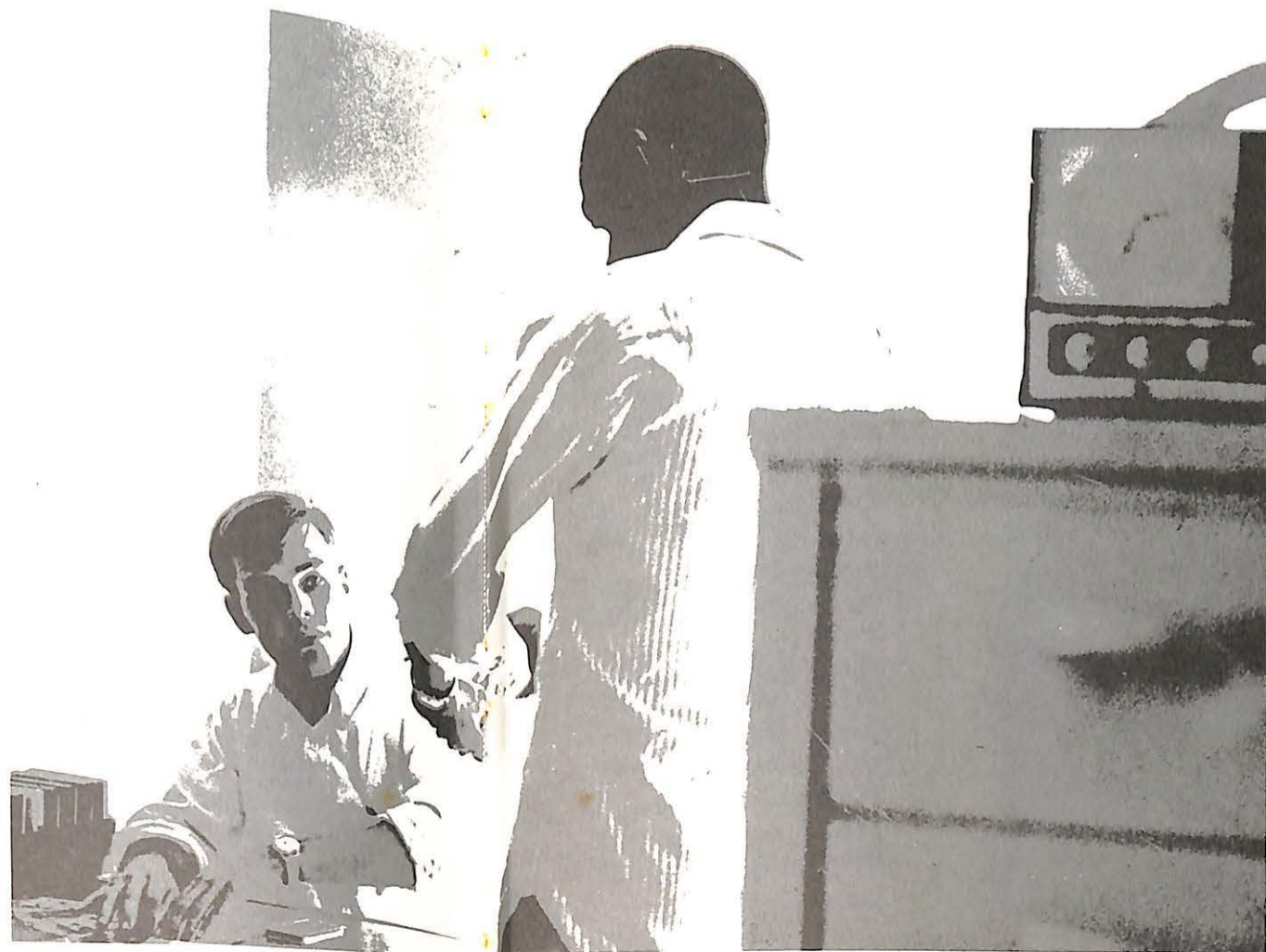
