The year 1957 found Head Coach Volney C. Ashford adding another winning season to his already enviable string of victories recorded at the helm of the Viking teams for the past eighteen years.

In spite of a long list of injuries and the pesky "flu bug" which cancelled two games, Coach Ashford guided his 1957 Valley gridders to a 4 and 2 won-lost record.

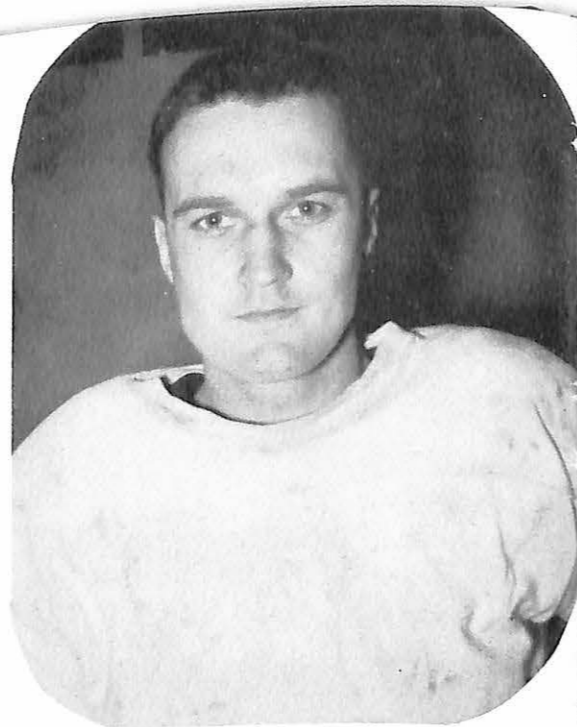
Valley's genial football mentor who also serves in the multi-capacity of vice-president of the college, director of athletics, professor of physical education, and head track coach, has steered his own Alma Mater teams to 132 victories, 31 losses and 8 ties over this lengthy period.

Much of the credit for Valley's success in the past two years can be attributed to Assistant Coach Grover Redford who played his collegiate football under Coach Ashford and who took over the assistant tutoring job in the fall of 1956. During the winter months Coach Redford assumes the duties of head basketball mentor along with his regular functions as assistant director of athletics.

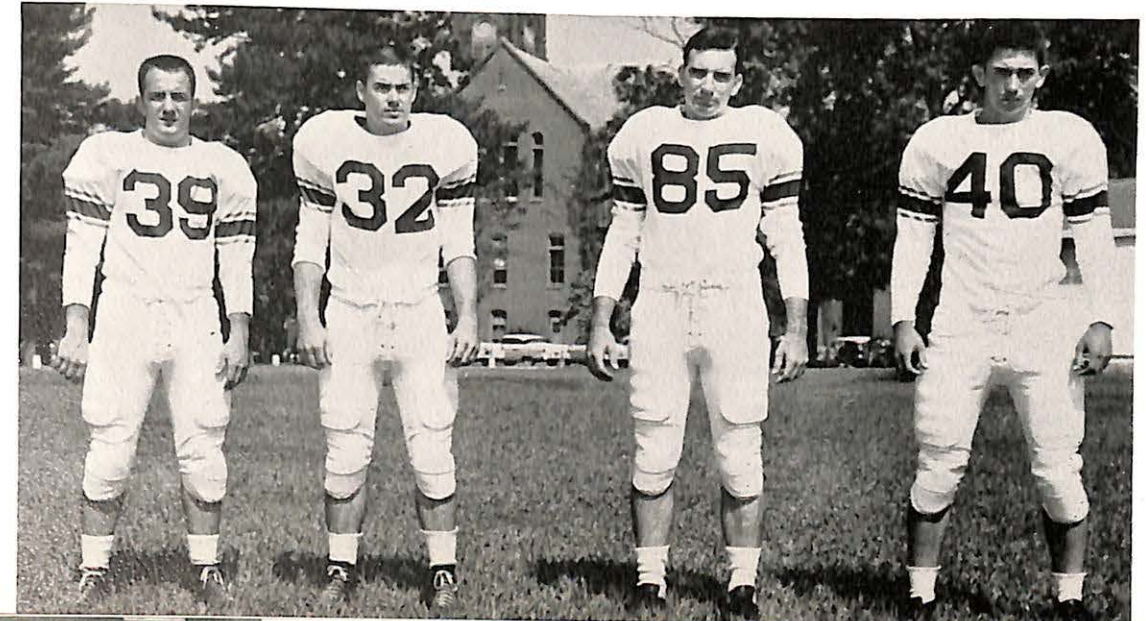

Valley's varsity basketball team had its ups and downs throughout the year but always managed to field a fighting aggressive unit that performed creditably in each encounter. Coach Grover Redford guided an inexperienced team composed of just one senior and two juniors to a record of 8 wins as compared to 10 losses with a 5-7 mark and a fifth place spot in the MCAU Conference standings.

Captain Nelson Hart, the lone graduating player, led the team in virtually all categories but of utmost importance was the fact that the major portion of sophomores and freshmen collected invaluable playing experience.

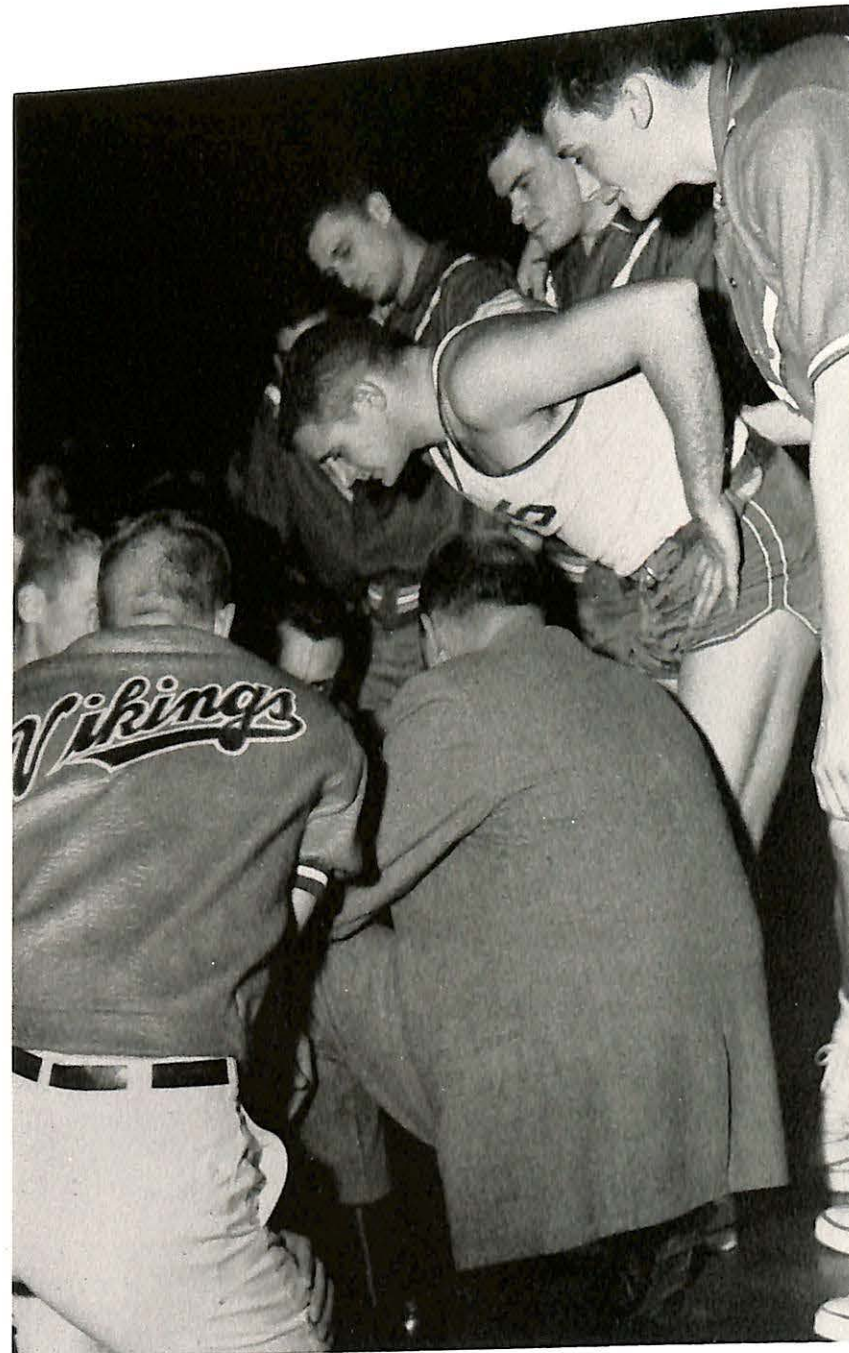
In addition to the 18 varsity games the B-teamers managed to salvage 1 win in 5 outings, taking the last contest to close out the campaign in winning style.

After being humbled in the varsity opener the Vikings bounced back to win 3 straight games before falling in the throes of a 6-game losing streak. The Valley men then polished off three consecutive foes, including big league upsets of Drury and Westminster Colleges.

A beating was administered by Culver-Stockton College and Central College followed with a close squeak in a real thriller in Morrison Gym. In an effort to gain the .500 mark for the end of the season the Vikes went on the attack to avenge an earlier loss to Stockton and came from behind to beat Graceland also.

Then in the season finale, with some 300 local fans making the 170-mile round trip to Liberty, the Vikes dropped a hard-fought match to their league arch rivals.

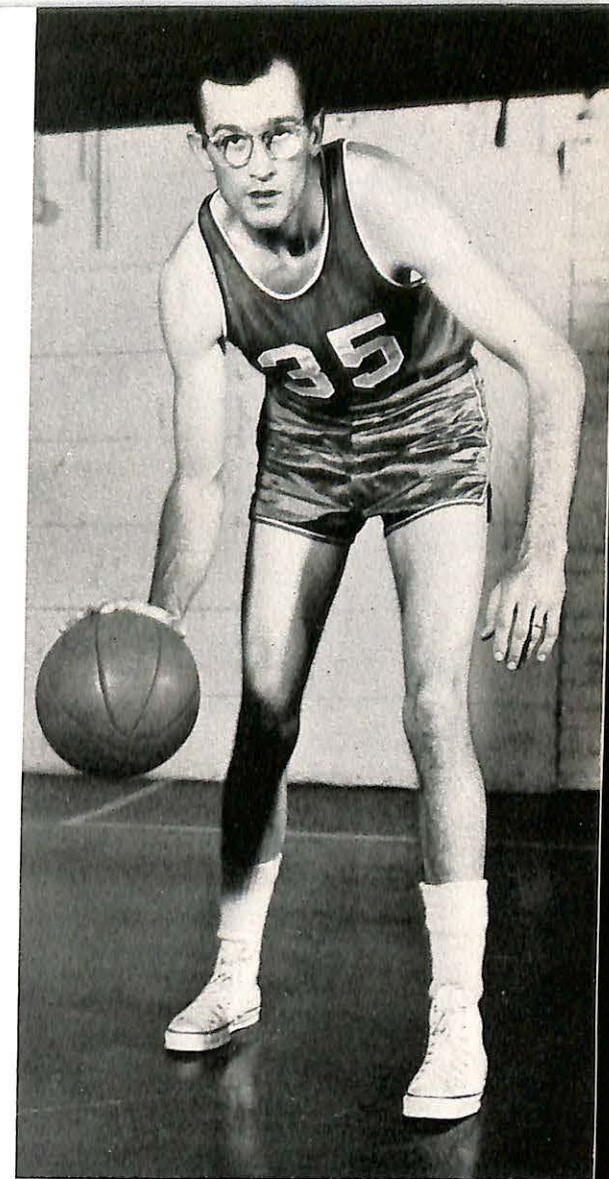
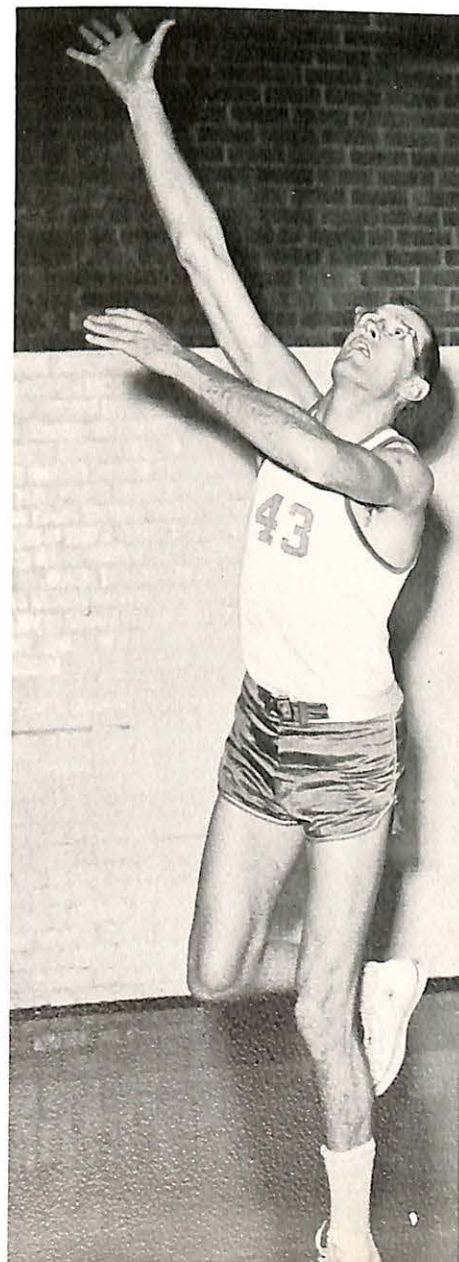

In rebounding Hart easily topped his mates with 177, 113 coming on defensive saves. As the veteran member of the team Nelson was a great leader and "take charge" guy. He was a true feeder from the lane and passed up many shots to set up mates on sure volleys.



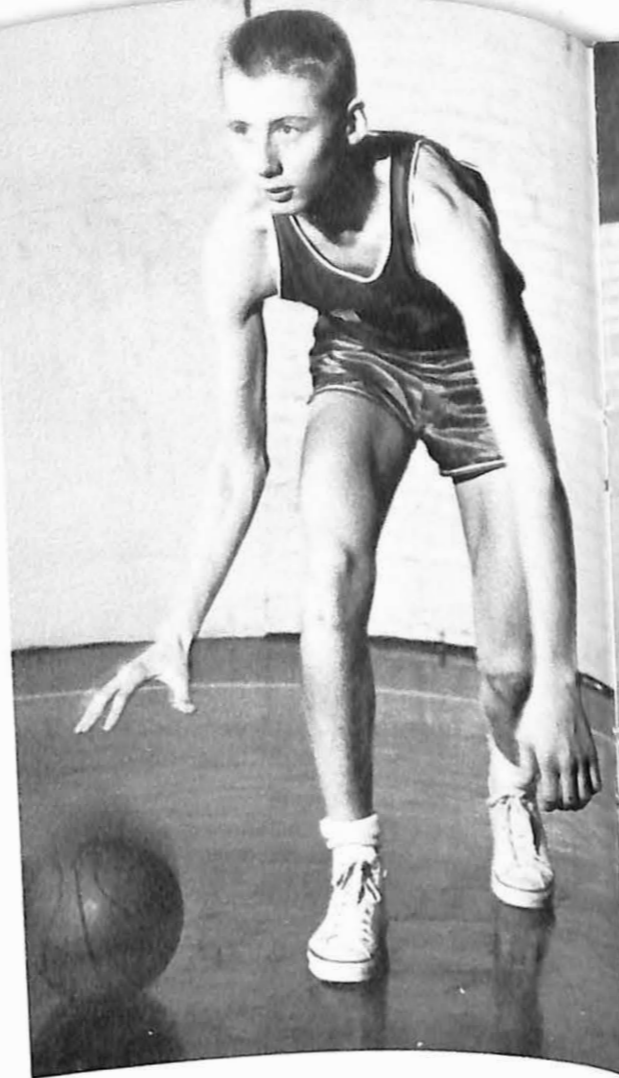

RETURNING LETTERMEN -- Two seniors and a junior returned this year to serve as important cogs for the Valley track team.

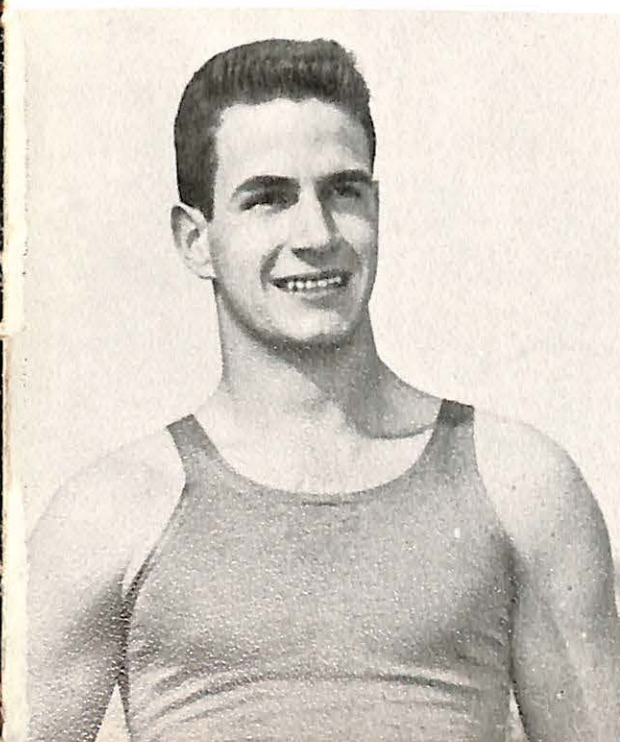
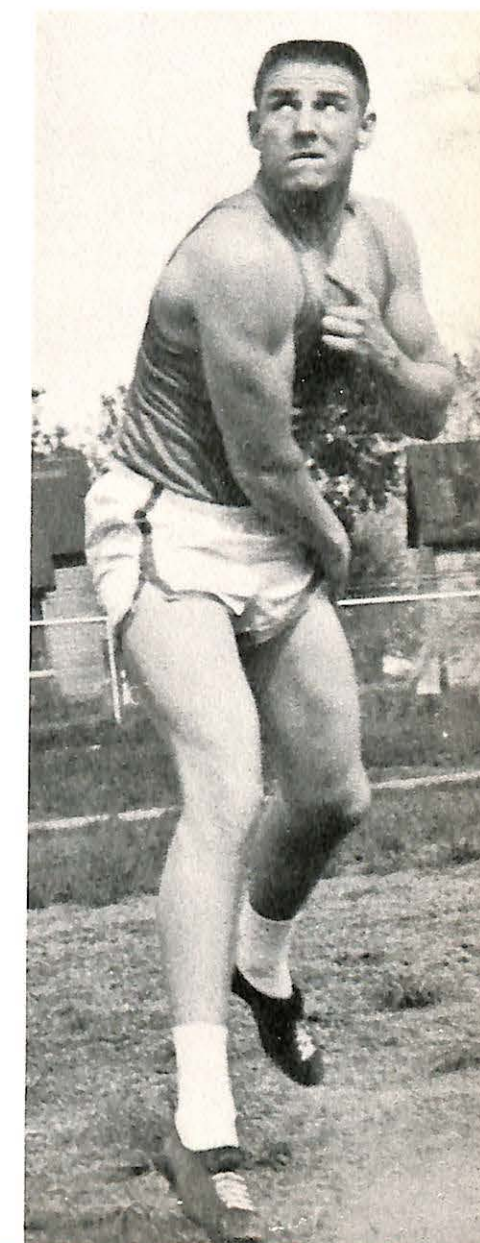

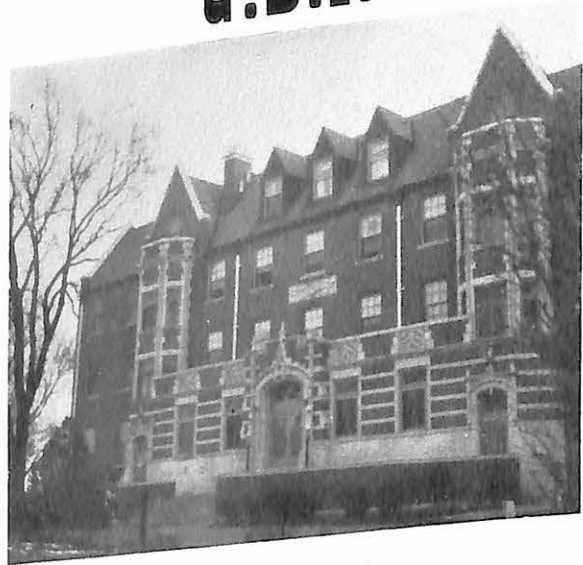

As we look back through the year we see a number of exciting and adventurous experiences and events which we feel have righteously represented the principles of the Independent Men.

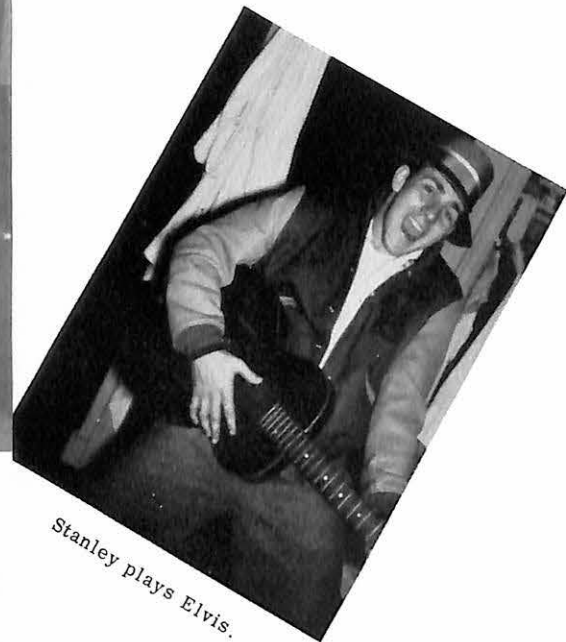

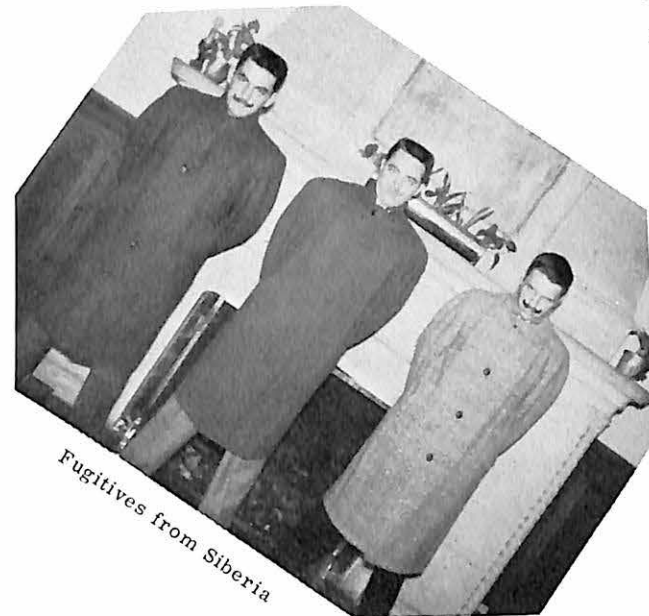

During the past sixty-four years the Missouri Valley DELTA has been published in a wide variety of sizes and formats. The Fall of this year saw the return to the full eight column, standard size newspaper. This achievement was accomplished under the supervision of Tom Algeo, Editor-in-Chief, and Jerry Arnett, Associate Editor, with the help of Carl Christensen and Robin Marris. Throughout the year the DELTA has attempted to give a complete and unbiased coverage to all campus news and happenings.

On December 12, 1957, the DELTA reached a milestone in its upward climb in the field of collegiate journalism by making final preparations for the first full eight page issue

devoted to Valley's activities. This dream was nearly shattered by the tragic fire which destroyed the printing facilities of the Daily Democrat News. Due to a burning desire on the part of the staff, arrangements were made in Sedalia whereby this goal was fulfilled.

In the second semester, under the able leadership of Carl Christensen and Robin Marris, another step forward was realized when a four page tabloid "extra" was printed on February 25, 1958. It marked the first time in the history of the school that a special edition has been published in excess of one page.

An Open Letter to the Student Body of Missouri Valley College

Dear Students,

For almost seventy years Missouri Valley College has stood as an institution of high learning. When we consider the countless ages since the time of creation, these seventy years do not actually represent a very long period of time; but it is long enough that Missouri Valley need find no excuse for being, for time itself seems to have declared our college "good".

During those seventy years, well over two-thousand students have received degrees from Valley, and countless others have come and gone. For each of these students a ticket to later life in the form of an education was available; not all of them took advantage of it. In addition Missouri Valley College created an episode in the lives of these people—an episode that lent a religious temper, a desire to succeed, and an unflagging spirit of determination that conquers. How do I know? The records show that the alumni of Valley are leaders, and are not the above ingredients of success?

Since its institution the college has grown from its one original building, Birkhead Hall, to include some eighteen structures, a modern stadium, and housing apartments for married students. The physical structure has grown, yes, and with it the number of faculty and the number of available courses. And as the overall campus make-up has changed and progressed, so have the administration policies. With each new generation of students, there are fewer and fewer restricting rules; paradoxically, it seems that the greater the policy of leniency, the greater the cry for increased student freedom. With each addition and improvement comes the realization that the next one will be harder to accomplish, but still the effort, although invisible at times, continues today.

Missouri Valley College was instituted and remains a church college, sponsored and largely supported financially by the Presbyterian Church. With this church affiliation comes certain rules which lend themselves to fostering a wholesome Christian atmosphere. Reverence towards God and ideals are exonerated by the great majority of our student body—ideals such as sportsmanship, that is shown time after time by our consistently victorious Viking athletes. The appreciation, of scholarship, that increases as academic standards increase, become more and more apparent here at Valley.

Yes, there are many things that are to be appreciated here at Missouri Valley. There is even the spirit of competition that prevails between student and student and between student and administration, which is, in a sense, healthy, for it at least shows that apathy does not reign. Luckily, above and beyond this competition, there is a friendliness, a cohesion, that is able to bring all factions together when the time arises.

As the whole can be no greater than its parts, just so Missouri Valley can be no better than its students and administration. I personally believe that it is a good college and will always consider it as my college.

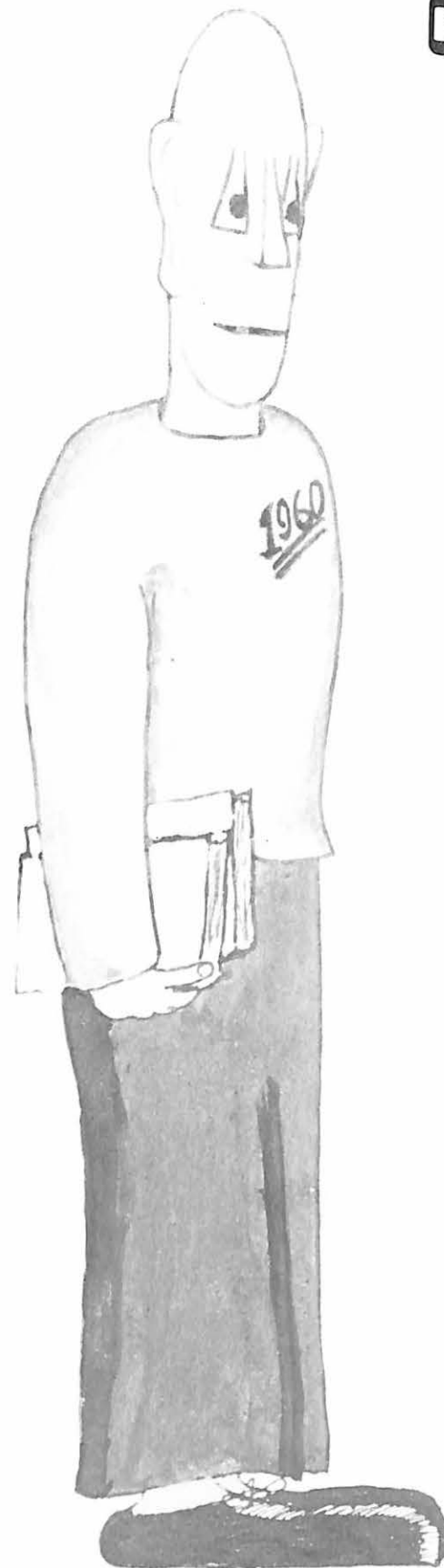
